In spite of the fact that they were beginners in high school, the freshman girls this year easily succeeded in winning the inter-class girls' championship in basketball. ENFORCEMENT OF DRY LAWS URGED

upon whom we depend to uphold our Americanism awakens to the realization that bootlegging is not a mere pastime, but it is a nefarious and traitorous business.

"That it is difficult at this hour to enforce prohibitory laws we do not deny, and that there are violations of the law we do not doubt, but the laws against murder have been known on this continent since the Puritan walked our shores; and yet we have many times awakened to find that human life is seemingly held lightly in our land. It is an easy matter to prevent the violation of a law by simply repealing it, but it is extremely doubtful that you would remedy any of the evils that arise from them by so doing. To nullify the prohibitory laws or to repeal them will cure no evils that arise from the liquor traffic, but you will set a precedent and make it more easy to nullify any law that may be rendered difficult of enforcement through propaganda or un-American prejudice.

"No part of our constitution is the dictum of kings. It represents the wisdom, foresight and discretion of the American people, articulating through a legislative system second to none on earth. The eighteenth amendment is an integral part of this constitution. It is a product of evolution, as are all other great reforms. As long as human nature is as it is, there cannot be 100 per cent enforcement of this or any other law. In the light of our experience with other laws, the success attained in the enforcement of this new and stringent law is remarkable and it may be reasonably anticipated that with the succeeding years the enforcement of this law nationally will improve under honest administration, just as has been the experience in the enforcement of this law in the many states which adopted it previous to the adoption of the national amendment.

"It must be admitted that one very

serious difficulty today in connection with prohibition law enforcement work is the surprising attitude of many in official and private life; men admittedly of high standing and great influence in their respective social, professional or business spheres, who would not knowingly wink at the violation of any other statute, but who will sanction and who participate in the illegal traffic in intoxicating liquor without any seeming shock to their consciences. It is not to be wondered at that bootlegging and criminals will violate the law for the sake of possible illegal gains, but it is difficult to understand how prominent businessmen, business and professional men, and men high in the various walks of public and private life become parties to such violations and create a demand for their continuance by purchasing illegally secured contraband.

"For the first time in the history of the country has concurrent power been written into the constitution. That is to say, section II of the eighteenth amendment divides the responsibility. Practically all of the states have enacted appropriate legislation to this end, and it is certainly most desirable that those states which have not enacted such legislation should speedily take that step.

"I desire also to call your attention to the fact that the Harrison narcotic act is administered by my department. Quite properly the narcotic traffic is today attracting tremendous interest all over this great land. While I am most appreciative of the great arousal of the people on the question of narcotics, I am at the same time thoroughly convinced that there is no great increase in the use of narcotics in America. Conditions are bad enough as they are, but not as bad as some try to depict. Our narcotic appropriation is and has been, in my judgment, entirely inadequate. We have only about 175 field men, and only \$750,000 with which to combat this evil.

"The greatest obstacle to the effective enforcement of the Harrison narcotic act is the smuggling of these drugs from foreign countries, and the distribution thereof throughout the United States, which has increased, no doubt, since the required accountability has been increased for legitimate handlers of the prohibited drugs; and a more drastic policy with regard to the smugglers trafficker in the deadly drugs has been adopted. With regard to this feature of enforcement of the Harrison narcotic act, reference should be made to recent legislation, approved May 26, 1932, and familiarly known as the Jones-Miller bill. This legislation was introduced in congress and entirely sponsored by Senator Jones and Representative Miller, both of the state of Washington. Reference to this act as amending 'The Narcotic Law' has created the erroneous impression that it amended the Harrison narcotic law, whereas it is a continuation and extension of the act of February 9, 1909, entitled 'An Act to Prohibit the Importation and Use of Opium for Other Than Medical Purposes,' as amended by the act of January 25, 1914, which is a customs act and is administered and enforced by the narcotics control board created by the act and the customs division of the treasury department. The drugs import and export act is proving effective and in so far as its enforcement curtails the smuggling of narcotic drugs into this country, to that extent it will aid the internal revenue bureau in the enforcement of the Harrison act.

"The results being accomplished in the enforcement of the Harrison narcotic law, considering the limited forces engaged upon this work, is indeed gratifying. The importance of concentrating upon this evil with a view to its eradication in so far as possible, is being emphasized and a special force was segregated and required to give its entire time

to the enforcement of the Harrison act. From this increased activity there resulted during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1932, the first year after the segregation of this force, an increase of 65 per cent in the number of cases reported over the fiscal year 1931. An increase of approximately 100 per cent in the convictions secured during the fiscal year 1932 is indicative of the nature of the cases made and the seriousness with which the courts are now looking upon violations of the narcotic law. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1932, there were 2,194 convictions obtained for violations of the Harrison narcotic law, which resulted in total sentences of over 2,814 years. These results have brought the narcotic situation in this country to light and created an erroneous impression that there is an alarming increase in the traffic.

"It will be of particular interest to you to know of the results secured in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, in the states of California, Washington and Oregon, which are all in the San Francisco narcotic enforcement division. In the state of California there were 233 cases reported against unregistered parties and 188 convictions were obtained, which resulted in sentences totaling 124 years and total fines of \$43,536. In the state of Oregon there were reported and pending from the previous year 96 cases. Sixty-four convictions were obtained, which resulted in sentences aggregating over 54 years and fines of \$2,650. In the state of Washington there were 233 cases reported during the year, and convictions obtained in 178 cases, which resulted in sentences imposed of approximately 60 years, with fines of some \$5,309.

"While the drug situation is always what might be termed alarming, there is ample justification for the statement that general conditions are improving.
