ELK BOTHERING

CROPS OF FARMERS

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Jan. 18.—Are Oregon elk privileged characters to prey upon the crops of honest farmers without let or hindrance under protection of a state law which forbids the farmer from molesting these animals?

That is what A. Y. Meyers of Eastern Malton county would like to know.

Meyers appeared before the ways and means committee of the legislature here last night with a claim for \$299 to cover damage done to his crops and property by a band of elk released in the mountains east of here several years ago. According to Meyers the elk invaded his ranch in the foothills during the winter of 1920, destroyed a seven-acre field of oats and rye, a two-acre patch of wheat and a small patch of potatoes.

Tear Down His Tent. "I did not care to dog or shoot the critters," Meyers told the committee. "If I had they would have sent me to jail. So I chased them off my place and for about a mile and they followed me right back home. The next year they came again. I carried a tent over my field to live in while I guarded the pests off. I could not carry bedding over at the same time so I had to make another trip. When I got back the next day the elk had torn my tent down and torn one side of it to shreds. I had to do guard duty for 33 days to keep them off my place that year. The game commission refuses to stand responsible for damages or to give me any protection.

"Other farmers in my section have also suffered from these elk. What are we going to do about it?"

Told To File Bill. Meyers was told to file his bill with the claims committee of the legislature. If it was found to be just, an appropriation will be made to be paid out of the funds of the game commission.

BASKETBALL SEASON IS IN FULL SWING

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19. (United Press.)—The basketball season on the Pacific coast is now in full swing. For more than a month scores of amateur teams in every town in the state have been working out many of them playing regular series of games. Most of them playing several games a night. Town teams high school teams, and athletic club teams are playing better basketball and drawing better crowds than ever before, according to reports from all up and down the Pacific slope.

In addition to the local teams the "big leaguers" of the coast, which attract the attention of fans outside of their own particular localities, are under way. The greatest interest, of course, is in the teams of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Conference, the Southern California conference, the Northwest Conference and in the teams representing the Los Angeles, Olympic, and Multnomah athletic clubs.

Light veterans of the University of California squad make the Golden Bears look more formidable than ever, despite the loss of Eggleston, Coop, and Larkely from last year's

five. Coach Wright has a world of material and should be able to push his team to first place or close to it in the big conference circuit. Inability to cope with teams in the northwest cost the Bears the championship last year.

At Stanford the prospects are none too bright but Andy Kerr is working hard and has a nucleus of good men including Captain Rogers, Jansen, DeGroot, and Melrose around which he can build a fast squad.

The University of Southern California seems hopelessly out of luck with Captain White as the only veteran on the squad. Several of last year's freshmen and this year's football players are planning to play however, and may bolster the team considerably.

Except for the California team it looks as though the northern end of the conference will be much stronger than the southern.

The Oregon Aggies, who have just completed a most successful training tour of the bay region, have a lot of power and speed. They play clean, heady basketball and will give the rest of the teams in the conference an awful fight. If they don't win the championship themselves.

The University of Washington quintet which finished fourth last year promises to be much stronger this season. Coach Edmundson has only three lettermen to start with but he has several promising candidates for each position.

Washington state and Oregon are unknown quantities but should be at least as good as last year. Nevada will be handicapped by the loss of "Rabbit" Bradshaw, a really remarkable player.

The dividing of the conference into two sections has met with much approval. The championships of the north and south sections will meet in a series for the championship. The matter will thus be definitely settled instead of being in the air, as was the case last year because several of the leading teams had not met other leading teams.
