BLAME FOR TRAIN WRECK IS PLACED

Holding that the conductor was responsible for the derailment at Winchester the board of inquiry turned its report yesterday. The board was composed of D. S. Weir, chairman, H. A. Hampton, division engineer; F. E. Cavendar, master car repairer; G. W. Young, real estate dealer and H. B. Hudson, merchant. It was found that the accident was caused by slack in the train while a car was rocking, this allowing the car to jump from the rails. There were two engines ahead in the train and two in the center, while rules require a helper ahead of at least every twenty-five per cent of the tonnage. Had the conductor followed the rules the wreck would have been avoided, the board holds.

UMPQUA HARBOR BILL CARRIED

The following message telling of the victory in the lower house of Congress of the army appropriation bill for Rivers and Harbors, was received by the News-Review from Congressman W. C. Hawley: "We have won the fight in the house which has just voted on roll call to increase the river and harbor appropriation to \$56,500,000. This is the amount recommended by the engineers and will provide during the current year for Coos Bay, \$1,213,000; for Yaquina, \$139,000; for Umpqua, \$276,500; for Columbia, \$1,700,000; for Clatskanie, \$9,124; for Willamette River, \$29,600. The total amount for our district is \$3,390,820. The vote carried 196 to 72."

HIGHWAY BOARD TO STAY ON JOB

Agreement Between Governor
Pierce and Commission
Is Reached

NUNN ALSO RETAINED

Commission's Future Depends
Upon Action of Legislature
on Administration's Plan
to Pay Commissioners

SALEM, Or., Jan. 19.—At a conference between Governor Pierce and the state highway commission this afternoon it was agreed that the present commissioners will remain at their post until March at least; that Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, who had presented his resignation today, would remain for the present and that the commission would proceed to let road work which is advertised for the February meeting. There also will be some road work advertised for the March meeting. It was the intention, according to report, that Governor Pierce would request the commissioners not to let the February jobs and to hold up projects ready for advertising. Had this reported plan of the governor been carried out the commissioners would have walked out tonight and then the governor would have been compelled to appoint new commissioners at once in order that vouchers could be signed.

BRIDGE BILL OF LOCAL INTEREST

Passage of Bill Introduced by
Senator Eddy Means Park
Bridge to Be Built

MONEY IS AVAILABLE

City Has Agreed to Bear Half
of the Cost Up to \$10,000
While County Is Ready
to Bear Its Portion

If the bill introduced by Senator B. L. Eddy, providing an increase from \$2,500 to \$50,000, in the maximum cost of bridges for which county courts may prepare plans and specifications, is passed there will be little loss of time in starting construction on the bridge to Umpqua Park. Addition, it is understood, the situation existing here is one of the main reasons for the introduction of this bill, the court having several bridges to build in the near future. On its own plans the court believes it can construct safe and durable structures at a much less cost than they can be built under the plans of the state bridge department.

SENATE APPROVES OF FARM CREDITS

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FOREST GRAZING TO BE INCREASED

Authorization for Increased
Grazing Allotments Comes
to Forest Supervisor

APPLICATIONS NOW DUE

Forest Service Will Receive
Applications From Stockmen
for Grazing Permits Until
Middle of February

An increase in range allotments on the Umpqua National Forest has been granted, according to Forest Supervisor Carl B. Neal, and it will be permissible to graze 400 more head of cattle and 2400 more sheep on the various ranges this year than were permitted last year. Grazing applications will be received from now until the middle of February and cattle and sheep men who desire to put stock on the range this year, should file their applications with the forest supervisor as soon as possible.

The increase in range is made possible largely because of the opening up of new feed and new ranges because of new trails. The increase does not affect the entire forest but only in spots, which are thrown open to grazing because of the construction of new trails and stockways leading into those areas. The Bohemia district is being thrown open to grazing and also the Grashopper district on the South Umpqua.

NEW TEACHER COMING

Prof. A. Adriance of the University of California has been employed by the local school board and will arrive here in a few days to teach English and Modern history in the local high school. He will take the place of Miss Helen Miller who has been forced to resign because of ill health. Prof. Adriance is a graduate of the University of California and has been taking post graduate work.

BOND BIDS REJECT

The county court today rejected all bids on the 1917 road bonds offered for sale. The bids were below par and consequently the court decided not to sell the bonds which were offered in the sum of \$35,500. Two bids were submitted, both by Portland bond buyers. One was considerably below par and the other was for par and accrued interest less a reasonable discount. The bond buyers stated that they are unable to dispose of 4 1/2 per cent bonds for more than their face value and consequently a discount is necessary. The bonds will be held until a more favorable bid can be received.

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
