WARREN ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE

DALLAS, Ore., Jan. 19.—Philip Warren, charged with the murder of Glen H. Price, prohibition agent, was found not guilty by a jury here tonight. The trial was on the second murder charge faced by Warren since the killing, a previous jury having freed him of a charge of killing Grover Todd, another dry agent.

The case went to the jury at 1:55 p. m. yesterday, and this afternoon the jurors informed Judge Belt that it was impossible for them to reach a verdict. The judge ordered them to retire and consider the case further. It was expected that the jury would be discharged late tonight if the members still were unable to agree. Shortly before 8 o'clock the jury asked Judge Belt for information as to the caliber of the revolver carried by Grover Todd, who was in the fight which followed the officers' attempt to arrest Warren on a charge of violating the prohibition law.

The judge told the jury that he could not issue instructions as to the evidence presented by witnesses. The jury retired and brought in a verdict 10 minutes later.

The defense stressed strongly the charge that Todd and Price had been drinking with Warren, who is an Indian. It was alleged that Warren was too drunk to know what he was doing when the fight occurred. The jury evidently considered it possible that Price had been killed by a wild shot from Todd's revolver.

The dry agents had gone to New Grande Ronde, where the shooting occurred, to get evidence on moonshiners.

REEDSPORT'S GROWTH CONTINUES STEADY

REEDSPORT, Jan. 20.—In spite of the fact that the winter months in most lines of business means greater unemployment and poorer trade, ReedSPORT is still gaining in population and in volume of trade. Her growth has been very noticeable during the past few months.

The new dry kiln which the Winchester Bay Lumber company is adding to its plant here has brought a number of additional men into the community and the attendant payroll. The Shore Light and Power company is also giving employment to local men, which adds to the general prosperity. C. McC. Johnson has been gradually increasing the capacity of his mill and the number of his employees and as receiver of the ReedSPORT Sash and Door company has added a new unit to the dry kiln. The last named company during the past year has increased the output of its product from the general average of about 100 doors, 4 by 8 feet, garage doors, each day, to about 400 such doors every day. The ReedSPORT Lumber company has added to its output during the past few months. In fact, every industry and business in the community has shown a steady and consistent growth in recent months, everything being just about the reverse of what usually takes place in the average town during the winter months.
