CLASSES STARTED IN LADIES' TAILORING

Classes in ladies' tailoring and dressmaking under the vocational training of Smith-Hughes act, will be conducted at the high school for the next four weeks under the direction and personal supervision of Edmund Gurney, a tailor of many years' experience. SPONSOR OF MARRIAGE BILL HEARS PROTESTS

SALEM, Jan. 23.—Trying to tell other people just how they should get married isn't an altogether one-sided pastime.

At least Representative Lovejoy of Multnomah is quite thoroughly convinced of that fact.

Mr. Lovejoy introduced a bill providing that both men and women must submit to a medical examination, and also provided that anyone with no greater mental capacity than a 12-year-old child should get married. The bill exempted women over 45 years of age from its provisions.

The ink had scarcely dried on the newspapers telling the world of the Lovejoy bill before the fun began. Telegrams, letters, men and women themselves, telephone calls, all sorts and conditions of communications, petitions, resolutions, memorials and remonstrances began flooding Lovejoy's desk.

Of course, it is generally understood that the democratic representative from Multnomah very kindly introduced the bill at the instance of Dr. Owens-Adair, who long has had hobbies along these lines.

But Lovejoy was the introducer of the bill and Lovejoy has suddenly found himself blessed with an entirely new line of correspondents. He says it makes him think of the old days when a fellow would send a dime to some publication in Augusta, Maine, and get his name placed on a mailing list.

Among those who are strenuously objecting to the bill are a great number of Christian Scientists, who object to the provision for a medical examination by a regularly licensed doctor of medicine. But they are not alone in their objections to any means as men, women, and some who are little more than children, are joining in the chorus. So far it is not certain
