E. Helms arrived in the city yesterday from her home in Portland. Mrs. Helms will spend several days visiting here with friends and relatives.

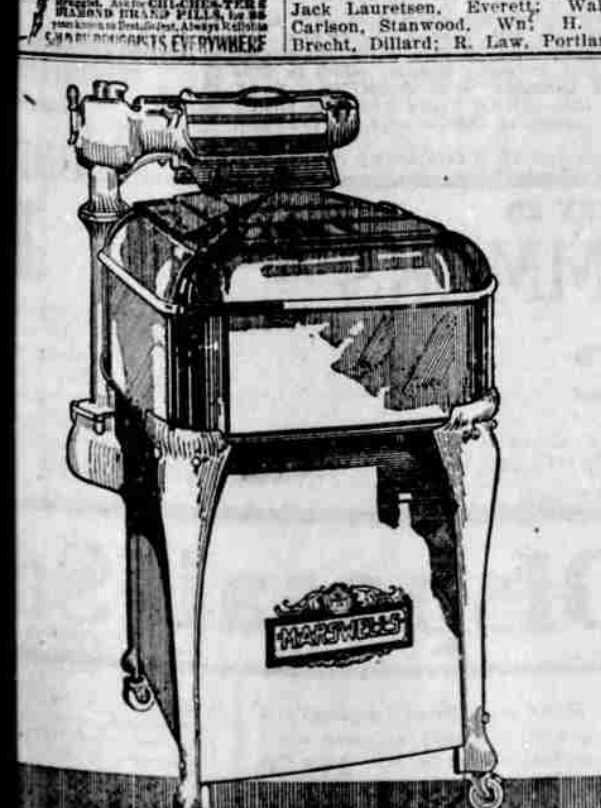

STATE EMERGENCY BOARD IS DOOMED

SALEM, Jan. 24.—The state emergency board is doomed.

Its death knell was sounded Monday afternoon by various members of the Oregon senate during the consideration of a bill covering deficiency appropriations aggregating \$665,867.

The deficiencies had been authorized by the emergency board during the past biennium to meet emergency financial needs arising in various state departments and institutions. They represented obligations which the state was legally bound to pay. The quicker they were paid the less they cost the state in accruing interest.

The senators—with five exceptions—voted for the bill with that understanding, but in so voting they made it clear that they regarded the emergency board under present conditions an expensive luxury which could well be dispensed with under the present demand for retrenchment and economy.

Senator Zimmerman who objected to "railroading" the measure through without time to give it proper consideration. The bill was rushed through the senate on suspension of the rules. He declared that he realized the obligation to pay the deficiencies but he wanted the people to know what the emergency board and hoped that it could be thrashed in the future.

Senator Eddy sided with Zimmerman in his demand for greater light on appropriation measures and incidentally took a shot at the emergency board.

Senators Garland, Strayer, Hall and Johnson also declared for the abolition of the emergency board.
