HIGHWAY FINANCE. PEAK TO BE IN 1927

Maintenance and Betterment State Highways Practically Exhaust Highways Funds That Are Collected.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 23.—The peak of interest and principal requirements on highway bonds will be reached in 1927, when, with a conservative increase in the number of motor vehicle registrations and no change in the present schedule of fees, the estimated excess will amount to approximately \$1,100,000 or just about equal the maintenance and betterment costs. Members of the legislature should bear this statement in mind when called on to change the present motor vehicle fee plan and the gasoline tax.

The proposal for instance, to split the gasoline tax 50-50 between the highway fund and the market road fund is likely to upset the method worked out to retire the outstanding bonds and keep up the roads built.

Financial facts of the highway program are herewith offered so that the subject can be readily understood.

\$54,737,414 Already Spent.

The total bonded indebtedness of the state for highway purposes is four percent of the assessed valuation, which amounts to \$40,379,966, of which \$36,200,000 has been sold. Since 1917 a total of \$54,737,414 has been disbursed of which \$6,747,047 was county funds; \$4,546,530 were government funds; \$98,381 were railroad funds for co-operation on grade crossings eliminations, and \$36,200,000 were state funds. The total amount expended in the 1921-1922 biennium amounted to \$30,905,255, of which \$18,645,334 was expended in 1921 and \$12,259,921 in 1922.

Of the total expenditures for 1921-1922, 54.32 percent was bond money; 12.89 percent motor license fees; 6.13 percent gasoline tax; 10.44 percent federal co-operation; 15.53 percent county co-operation and .69 percent miscellaneous income. Of this amount, 30.38 percent was expended for grading; 24.26 percent for paving; 16.17 percent for rock or gravel surfacing; 8.08 percent for bridges; 8.52 percent for interest and principal and bonds; 4.04 percent for maintenance and betterment; for surveys and field engineering, 4.90 percent; for administration and general supervision, 1.31 percent and 2.34 percent for co-operation on forest roads.

Income Also Increases.

Income from motor license fees, 75 percent of which is paid into the

state highway fund and 25 percent returned to the counties, has increased much more than was anticipated. The number of motor vehicles has increased from 103,790 in 1920 to 118,615 in 1921 and 134,566 in 1922.

The income from license fees paid into the state highway fund has increased from \$1,481,122 in 1920, to \$1,624,983 in 1921 and \$2,358,987 in 1922. The increase in 1922 is due to increase in schedule rate as well as increase in number of registration. The average total increase fee after deducting administration costs is \$23.61 per registration for 1922.

Income from the gasoline tax was \$404,050 in 1920; \$948,509 in 1921 and \$1,144,113 in 1922, all of which goes into the state highway fund. The large increase in 1922 was due to the increase from 1 cent to 2 cents. Refunds allowed by law on gasoline for industrial purposes applies only to the second law and amounted to about 5 percent of the law revenue from that enactment. The total income from gasoline per registration in 1922 was 8.52.

Registrations On Increase.

Combining the 75 percent share of the license fees and the gasoline tax in 1922 amounted to \$3,503,100 against which there were interest and principal charges of \$1,646,916, leaving a balance of \$1,856,184, out of which there was expended for maintenance \$551,621, and for betterment, \$129,729, leaving \$1,184,732 for other purposes.

In 1923 there is estimated an increase in motor vehicle registrations of approximately 10,500 as compared with an increase of 15,951 between 1921 and 1922. This will produce an estimated income to the state highway fund of \$3,804,000 against which there are interest and principal requirements of \$1,872,675, leaving a balance of \$1,931,325, of which it is estimated that maintenance and betterment will require approximately \$1,000,000.
