RETURN ASTORIA'S TAX IS PROPOSED

Bill Would Allow Astoria To Retain
Amount of State Tax Until
Fund to Rebuild Public
Works Is Raised.

SALEM, Jan. 25.—With the hopes
of any direct appropriation sent
glimmering by the adverse attitude
of the joint committee on ways and
means on the proposed \$500,000 ap-
propriation for Astoria relief, Rep-
resentative Mott of Clatsop county,
is preparing a bill which he hopes
will be acceptable to the committee
and the legislators generally.

Mott proposes that the state taxes
within the corporate limits of the
city of Astoria, amounting to ap-
proximately \$75,000 annually be re-
mitted for a period of years that
will make the total equal the \$500,-
000 appropriation asked. This money
he would divert into a fund to pay
the principal and interest on a bond
issue, the proceeds of which would be
used in the reconstruction of the
destroyed public works.

It is admitted by the members of
the ways and means committee
that there is no chance of affording
Astoria relief in the way of a direct
appropriation at this time, and final
action on the appropriation bill has
been delayed by the desire of the com-
mittee to work out if possible some
other means of extending aid. The
proposal that the state road tax of
a quarter mill be diverted for the
purpose has met with quiet but de-
termined opposition, and the plan to
finance a non-interest bearing loan
to Astoria from some dormant state
fund, like the workmen's compensa-
tion fund, has suffered a like fate.

What the attitude of the ways and
means committee would be toward
Mott's new proposal could not be
learned today, but the bill will be
introduced tomorrow and an effort
made to get it before the commit-
tee tomorrow night when final dis-
position of the Astoria relief matter
is planned.

LOWER RIVER TOWNS ENJOYING GROWTH

Reedsport and Gardiner Are Im-
proved and Increased by New
Buildings and Business
Enterprises.

Reedsport and Gardiner are en-
joying a rapid growth, according to
P. C. Schulte who arrived in Rose-
burg today to attend to rearing mat-
ters. At both places new buildings
are being erected at a very rapid
rate and considerable progress is
assured.

The new I. O. O. F. hall is rapidly
nearing completion and will be ready
for occupancy in the very near fu-
ture. In fact, some of the business
houses which are to occupy the
lower floor have already moved in.

A new two-story building 100 by
100 feet in size will be built in the
near future, piling and other material
already having been procured. This
structure will be used for business
and apartment purposes.

The Umpqua Steam Navigation
Company is completing the con-
struction of a boat shop and dry
dock at East Gardiner. The ways
are large enough to take the big-
gest boats now in use on the Ump-
qua. This will be a big aid in boat
building and repair work and will
doubtless prove to be a successful
enterprise.

The Umpqua Storage and Supply
company is also putting up a new
cold storage and refrigeration plant
at East Gardiner.

Mr. Schulte also reports that the
river boat Juno is to be replaced
with a larger boat. A 90 horse-
power Atlas Imperial Diesel engine
was recently ordered for the Juno
and when the engine arrived and
the boat was taken out of the water
for the installation it was found
that the hull was in poor condition.
Consequently a new boat will be
built and will replace the well
known boat.

RITNER EXPLAINS PRISON RELEASES

Senator Who Released Fifty-Two
Prisoners Gives Reasons For
Exercising Clemency

SALEM, Jan. 25.—Senator Roy
Ritner, of Umatilla county who as
acting governor during the month
of December while Governor Olcott
was attending the governors' con-
ference in the east released by ex-
ecutive clemency, paroles or pardons
from the penitentiary some 52 con-
victs, gave a number of specific in-
stances of the details of the cases
involved in order that he might re-
verse the general opinion that par-
dons were granted promiscuously in
his talk at the Rotary club luncheon
today. "In every instance the re-
lease of a prisoner was recommended
by either the parole board and
Warden Lewis, the judge who sat
at the trial and conviction or the
district attorney and was not carried
out until I was satisfied that the
man would not be a menace to so-
ciety," he said.

"If the facts had been made pub-
lic during the administration under
Governor West or Withycomb it
would have been known that there
were less than one fifth as many
released last year as there was in
any year of the administration of
the two governors named," he said.

One of the men was sentenced
from eastern Oregon to a term of 25
years for the stealing of an auto-
mobile tire was among those re-
leased after having served four, he
said. "There are at present in the
penitentiary men who are serving
sentences of but one or two years
when they stole the whole automo-
bile," Senator Ritner said.

One of the men, remembered by
Salem residents who attended the
Melody Minstrel as the one who
played the mouth organ, was sen-
tenced to a three year term because
he "beat up" on a man that had
made fun of his hair lip. "I par-
doned him," was the comment of
Ritner.

POLITICIANS HAVE NO CHANCE WITH LEGION

ANDERSON, Ind., Jan. 25.—
Speaking before an audience which
included Governor Warren McCray
and the members of the Indiana
state legislature, Alvin Owsley, na-
tional commander of the American
Legion, stated that the Legion is a
nonpolitical, nonsectarian organiza-
tion and that it is not interested in
the political destiny of any of the
great parties, at a recent dinner in
honor of Mr. Owsley held in Ander-
son.

The Legion commander replied to
an assertion that the Legion was
engaged in political activity in Cal-
ifornia, made in Congress by Rep-
resentative Goodknight, Republican,
West Virginia.

"Mr. Goodknight charges that
the American Legion of California
appreciates and is undertaking to
circulate a speech of William G. Mc-
Adoo, in which he discussed the ad-
justed compensation bill," Mr. Ows-
ley stated. "I have no information
that this is true. But if it is, I must
also call the attention of the con-
gressman to the fact that for more
than a year the American Legion
has been circulating through its
proper channels to its members and
to the general public the addresses
of the Hon. Joseph W. Fordney,
chairman of the ways and means
committee of the House at the pres-
ent time, and the author of the ad-
justed compensation bill. If the
distinguished statesman from West
Virginia will make a good speech
favoring the adjusted compensation
bill, the Legion will, in all likelihood,
give the largest circulation that he
has ever had in all his life."

Adequate naval and land forces
to protect the country pending the
mobilization of volunteering troops
and a ban on immigration for period
of ten years were among the national
policies advocated by the Legion
chief.

Mr. Owsley attacked the war
profiteers with great severity and
turning to Governor McCray, he
said: "You will agree with me, sir,
when I say that if these men have
taken the money of the people, they
should pay the price behind prison
bars."
