RED LODGE, Mont., Jan. 26.—After having arranged with Mike Popovich to fight a duel, Mike Rejonovich reported to Police Chief McAllister that Popovich had threatened to shoot him and would be found with a gun in his possession. Chief McAllister repaired to the rendezvous for the encounter and "covered" Popovich when the latter appeared. Popovich was so infuriated at this denouncement that he refused to give up his weapon and McAllister was compelled, at the risk of his own life, to beat the man over the head before he could disarm him.

The foregoing is the gist of a story told Justice of the Peace Newman, when the two principals were arraigned on charges of carrying concealed weapons, disturbing the peace and threatening to kill.

Rejonovich's alleged frameup developed a "kickback" when Justice Newman fined him \$50 and sentenced him to serve 10 days in the county jail. Apparently believing that Popovich was more alarmed against than against the court imposed a fine of \$50 and let him go.

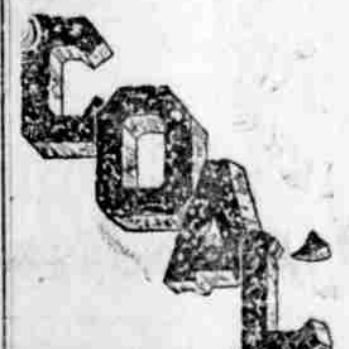
