MEETING OF FARM BUREAU IS HELD

a report of his year's work. The report of the county agent was an excellent one and covered the agricultural activities of the county in a most thorough manner.

He stressed the importance of organization and stated that marketing is the most important problem before the farmers of the county today. There is no use to show farmers how to grow two blades of grass where only one grew before unless he can obtain a good price for the first blade, Mr. Cooney said. The county agent is wasting his time if he endeavors to persuade the farmer to put in electric washers, running water and other improvements into the home until he can provide a market for the farmer's produce and can see that he is making a profit. If a farmer is making a profit, he will see that the improvements are made and the development will take care of itself, but until the market is established and he is operating his farm at a profit, it is useless to try to get improvements.

Mr. Cooney urged the farmers to give more attention to the planting of legumes, in an effort to restore lands which have been used up by the continuous growing of wheat. Much of the hillside land can be made productive by the growing of vetch, he stated, and nitrates which have been removed in past years can be easily restored.

He also urged the growing of corn to feed livestock and turkeys. Douglas county's turkey crop was worth a half million dollars, he stated, and was fed almost entirely on Nebraska corn.

He gave statistics showing the diversified work of the county agent and the great interest taken by farmers in securing knowledge of up-to-date methods of conducting their farms.

Mr. Cooney expressed his thanks for the courtesy extended him by the press of the county. Through the various newspapers, he said, he has been able to reach practically every farmer in the county with timely articles on spraying and other matters. It would have been impossible to have reached the farmers directly with this work in any other way, he stated. He particularly thanked the News-Review for its assistance and its willingness to assist in any way in promoting the agricultural life of the county. Mr.

of the Northwestern staff, a banker, editor, attorney, government employee and a few Northwestern alumni.

"Other cooperative flat buildings have been erected, but so far as I can ascertain they were built by brokers and contractors who sold them by apartments to new owners. Our building started as a cooperative project, was built without overhead costs through free service of the tenant-stockholders as supervisors, and will be paid for at actual cost of operation plus interest and part payment of principal year by year. Cooney stated that in all of his work he had never found a newspaper more willing to co-operate in every way than the News-Review.

His remarks along this line were continued by C. J. Hurd, former county agent here, now with the bureau of rural organization and markets, who stated that the News-Review and the Eugene Register are doing more than any other newspapers in the state of Oregon to promote agriculture and to aid the farmers in every possible way.

At noon the meeting was adjourned for a banquet in the M. E. church, where the majority of those attending gathered.

In the afternoon session, George Mansfield, president of the Oregon State Farm bureau, spoke, dealing particularly with the necessity of scientific farming through the county agent. In the present day farmers must give up the old-time methods and must come to the scientific ways of production, which have been brought to a high point of perfection, Mr. Mansfield stated. County agents trained in all of these ways and keeping in touch with all of the latest discoveries and developments, can be of the greatest assistance to the farmers if they will only consult with him and follow his advice. It is also necessary for the farmers to work with the men in town if the best results are to be accomplished. This can best be done through proper organization and the farmers should band themselves together in suitable organizations to promote their own welfare.

C. J. Hurd, now secretary of the bureau of rural organization and markets, made a short talk along marketing lines, a subject which is now of the greatest importance to the farmers. He stressed the need of co-operation and co-operative marketing and urged the formation of suitable organizations to study marketing conditions and to aid the farmers in securing the best price for their produce.

The meeting will conclude with a business session and the election of officers for the ensuing year.

At a late hour this afternoon, the proposed constitutional amendment, increasing the dues of the farm bureau from \$5 to \$7 was put to a vote and was carried. H. E. Kruger was elected president for the coming year. C. W. Groves, vice president; C. W. Moyer, secretary-treasurer; and R. A. Hercher and George Bacon, executive committee.

CAT WITH HISTORY FOUND IN MONTANA

AUGUSTA, Mont., Jan. 25.—A cat with a history is owned by Mrs. Montana August of this city. The cat is a white Persian-Angora, with one blue eye and a yellow one, and is totally deaf. Its name is Fluffy and it was born in the Minnola section in France in the spring of 1919.

Fluffy's mother, Annette, was the mascot of the famous Princess Pats, who obtained her in Belgium in 1917 and took her to France. Colonel A. J. Mulberry requested Mrs. August, who was then Captain Mae Morton of the Salvation Army, to care for Annette, and it was while in her charge that three kittens were born which were named Beauty, Fluffy and Annette.

Colonel Mulberry kept little Annette, gave Beauty to Secretary E. Perrott of General Pershing's staff, and presented Fluffy to Captain Morton. When the Americans boys were shipped back to the United States, Captain Morton was moved to Paris, Bordeaux and Brest. Little Fluffy went along. Then the two visited relatives of Captain Morton's father near the border of Scotland before sailing for Quebec.

Fluffy came to the United States when she lived in Salt Lake City, winning first prize at the Utah state fair there in 1921. When Captain Morton, who was in Montana as secretary of the Salvation Army home service department, became Mrs. Montana August and settled here, Fluffy accompanied her.

VISION NEEDED TO UPBUILD CITY

gress city, it will be because those who have a stake in its future, because of their investments in business, profession or property, do their share in the promotion of its progress and prosperity.

"There are two words in the English language that are being used more than any others at the present time in the solution of human problems and these are cooperation and organization. Cooperation in community life means that spirit which will inspire every man, woman and child who loves the town and has an interest in its development to stand together and work together and to pull together. Cooperation in order to be effective must have some medium for its expression and this is organization. The Chamber of Commerce is the medium through which the men and women of the community may work together in unity and harmony for the common good."

The speaker asked those present to look upon their Chamber of Commerce as the interest through which and by which they are to do their share in the work that must be done for Roseburg. A good secretary and a good president with a good board of directors does not necessarily mean a successful Chamber of Commerce, for the effectiveness of the Chamber will depend very largely on the zeal and interest of its members. Without that zeal and interest the officers cannot accomplish the things that must be done for the town.

Mr. Duryea alluded to two visions for the basis of the work of a successful Chamber of Commerce. The first is the vision of the growth of Roseburg in temporal things—those things that make for earthly prosperity. If it is right, he says, for the Chamber of Commerce to have a vision of a greater business for Roseburg; visions of a splendid country back of the town and the growth of the industrial life of the city, and to be working all of the time for a bigger and better business for Roseburg.

The second vision, however, he holds to be the most important, and that is a vision of the growth of Roseburg in spiritual things.

"We must catch a vision, he said, 'of the growth of this community into one filled with men, women and children imbued with a spirit of service and citizenship—a vision of those things which will make Roseburg a better place in which to live, working on the theory that to make the town a better place in which to live is to make a better place in which to do business.'"

He illustrated this by referring to the city of Whiting, Indiana, built by the Standard Oil Company, and Gary, Indiana, built by the U. S. Steel Company, where every effort has been made to make life satisfying and full of those things that make for happiness of the people.

He urged that the two visions be merged into one complete dream which should be the inspiration and incentive for effort on the part of the Chamber of Commerce, which should devote its energies to making this vision real and these things to come true.

He then emphasized the need of team work, stating that team work builds up communities just as team work wins football and basketball games for the high schools. Roseburg will never get any place unless the elements making up the life of the community work together in a spirit of unity and harmony.

He closed his talk with a poem by Edgar Guest on the Brotherhood of Better Things, emphasizing the

need of visions and the necessity of cooperation in the upbuilding of a city.

Mr. Duryea's talk was a wonderful inspiration and will doubtless result in increased activity in the Chamber of Commerce work in this city. The banquet was a decided success in every respect and all in attendance were well pleased.
