COLLEGE GIRLS VOTE ON TEN HOUR DAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—With the eight-hour day for women the predominant cry in industry, a ten-hour day for college women, six days a week, is the proposal just announced for Barnard College by the Board of Student Presidents. This organization, after long study, has presented the proposal to the undergraduate body for ratification or disapproval.

The plan proposes a new point system to regulate extra-curricular activities. The Barnard girls' twenty-four hours, it proposes, shall be divided as follows: eight hours for sleep, two hours for exercise, four hours for meals and incidental duties at home,

and ten hours for college activities.

It is explained that the new method of extra-curricular activities would be regulated by a point system, in which each point would stand for three hours of work. No student of Barnard, under the system, would be permitted to carry more than an aggregate of twenty points a semester of academic and extra-curricular work combined.

The plan is now up to the student body.

EDDY'S BILL MAY RESULT IN FIGHT

SALEM, Or., Jan. 26.—Unless an agreement is reached before early tomorrow, a bill introduced by Senator Eddy providing that all moneys collected from fines and forfeitures for violations of the liquor laws shall be split between the counties and the executive department for the enforcement of the prohibition statutes, probably will be returned to the floor of the senate with a divided report.

This was announced today following a meeting of the senate committee on alcoholic traffic. The measure provides that one-half of the money derived from the fines and forfeitures in liquor cases shall be set aside as a special fund to be used by the governor in enforcing the prohibition laws, while the remaining one-half up to the amount of two thousand dollars will be used by counties for a similar purpose. In the counties the special funds would be available for the use of district attorneys who are responsible for the enforcement of the liquor laws.

Eddy Demands Amendment.
Senator Eddy, at the meeting of the committee, insisted that he be allowed to amend the bill so as to include a narcotic provision. This request was protested by Senators Taylor and Ellis. In case Senator Eddy agrees to drop the narcotic amendment or incorporate the same in a new bill, Senator Ellis and Taylor said they would join in a favorable report. Should Senator Eddy refuse to comply, Senators Taylor and Ellis will file a minority report.

Senator Eddy's bill was said to have received the support of the administration and was suggested in the inaugural message of Governor Pierce.

The senate was in session less than two hours today and its work was confined to the receipt of 11 new bills, approval of six senate measures and one house bill on third reading, and a number of unimportant committee meetings.

STATE AID WANTED BY POULTRYMAN

SALEM, Jan. 25.—A petition containing the signatures of several hundred poultry raisers in all sections of Oregon has been filed with the joint committee on ways and means in support of a \$5000 appropriation for the investigation and control of poultry diseases. The petition is accompanied by a letter signed by a committee representing the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers with a membership of more than 1000 in Oregon, Idaho and southern Washington.

This letter calls to the attention of the lawmakers the rapid growth of the poultry industry in Oregon during the past few years and the importance to which the industry has now attained. So far, the letter sets out, the state has taken no steps toward recognizing the industry whose future is now threatened by the ravages of disease for the investigation and control of which the \$5000 appropriation for the biennium is asked. The letter sets out that repeated appeals to the state agricultural college for aid in combatting epidemics in poultry flocks in this state, resulting in heavy financial loss, have come unanswered because the college has had no funds with which to undertake this work.
