WASHINGTON LAW MAKERS ARE BUSY

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 29.—A special committee composed of two senators and three assemblymen has been appointed to receive all "blue sky" laws and weld them into a single measure.

Senator George F. Christensen, of Skamania county, is the only democratic state senator in the legislature. He claims that he is not in the least lonesome, calling attention to the fact democracy will have another Washington senator March 4, even if he does go to the national capital. "So you see there are two of us after all," says Senator Christensen.

Representative McKinney's so-called "klan bill" provides that no persons may appear in public with their faces disguised, or wearing hoods over their heads to conceal their features. Observers are wondering just how this sort of thing will work out. Of course the bill makes exception of masked parties and costume balls. There is no provision for the man who raises a beard late in life, or for the lady who lays the paint on an inch thick. Folks are wondering if McKinney will revamp the bill for the sake of the vamps and the whiskers.

As in the Oregon legislature, several income tax bills have made their appearance at Olympia. The provisions of many of these are so worded as to appeal for support on the grounds that the income they would produce would replace many

taxes now levied. But they are meeting with opposition from legislators who point out that if the state should depend largely on income tax revenue and the eastern part of the state should suffer a crop failure with consequent loss of income to the tax-payer and to the state, the western portion of the state would have to bear the burden of the cost of government. Observers believe that the income tax measures are due for a rough journey through the legislative halls.
