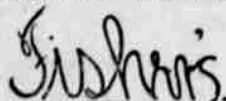

REPORT ON HALL BILL IS ADOPTED

(Continued from page 1)

pected before the measure is reported tomorrow morning. At a meeting today of the committee in charge of the bill Senator Hall excluded from its provisions the state librarian and state library until some time in the future when an educational department will be created. Senator Hall also abolished the bureau of mines and geology and the director of the bureau. Another amendment leaves the salary to be paid a state highway engineer to the conference of commissioners.

Power Given Governor. Senator Strayer suggested that the state banking department be exempted for two years from the consolidation bill, but Senator Johnson, a banker, said the banking department might as well be included. The question of keeping the banking department in or out was left to Senator Hall to determine.

Prohibit the most important amendment Hall has made is the creation of two additional commissioners, without salary, who would act as advisers and have an equal vote with the others. This makes the conference consist of the governor, state treasurer, secretary of state, two departmental paid commissioners, to be appointed by the governor, and two advisory commissioners, also appointed by the governor.

Some objection is made to the bill on the ground that it would enable a Democratic governor to build up a political machine, but there are Republicans who are perfectly willing that Governor Pierce have all the dictatorial power possible in the super-commission measure, arguing that if the governor does not make good on his pre-election promises with such an instrument at his disposal he will be politically killed forever.

Not since the reorganization fight in the senate, preceding the opening of the session, has any subject so stirred the feelings of the senators as the consolidation question. Consolidation now overshadows all other matters, income tax, tax reduction, prohibition or any other topic. When the Hall bill does come on the floor a battle royal is predicted.

MRS. DUNBAR ENDORSED FOR FEDERATION PRESIDENT

Mrs. Raldis Orr-Dunbar of Portland is being widely endorsed as candidate for the presidency of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs. The election will take place at the state convention to be held in Medford in May.

Among the recent endorsements of Mrs. Dunbar are the Umatilla Home Bureau, the Alameda Tuesday, the Women of Rotary, the Fortnightly, Overlook, Progressive Women's, Women's New Thought clubs, the Portland Grade Teachers' association and others. Mrs. Dunbar is at present chairman of the public welfare committee of the state federation. She is a member of the P. E. O. Sisterhood, secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis society and prominent among the social workers of the state and has many friends throughout Oregon.

AIRMAN FALLS FROM HEIGHT OF 3 MILES

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Jan. 29.—Unconscious because of the cold, First Lieutenant James D. Summers, pilot of the first pursuit group at Selfridge field, fell from an altitude of 13,000 feet to within 400 feet of the ground here Saturday afternoon, a drop of nearly four miles, before he recovered his senses, righted his plane and made a safe landing. Announcement of this experience was kept secret by aviators at Selfridge field until late today, when it was officially related.

Summers had been ordered to take part in maneuvers by Brigadier General William G. Mitchell. With several other aviators he mounted to a height of 19,000 feet when thermometer on the planes registered 20 degrees below zero.

Only Half Conscious.

Summers was but half conscious when other aviators reached him

after his descent. Examination announced severe cold, temporary blindness and unconsciousness probably followed. He practically had no control today, it was announced.

Describing his experience Lieutenant Summers said:

"At 19,000 feet my motor was running smoothly, but the cold was killing me. I was making 100 miles an hour. Suddenly I began to get dizzy and I lost work the controls. Then I went black. When I woke up I was dropping rapidly and was 100 feet above the earth. I don't know how I got my control and made a safe landing."
