LIQUOR CROOKS HIT BY PROPOSED BILL

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—Representative Lee of Clackamas county has introduced in the house a bill providing that any law enforcement officer who shall appropriate any captured intoxicating liquors to his own use, or who shall sell or give any captured intoxicating liquors, taken by him in raid or held by him as custodian, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. The penalty is fixed at not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 and imprisonment in the county jail for a period of 20 days.

LOCAL STUDENTS WILL ATTEND CONFERENCES

A delegation of Roseburg high school students, leave Friday for Eugene to attend the Oregon State high school press conference. The conference is composed of students from all of the high schools of the state where annuals or other publications are issued. The department of journalism at the University will give such advice and assistance as may be desired in solving problems which the schools have met and will give instructions which will be of aid in the publication of the school papers.

Roseburg high school will send the Umpqua and Orange R staffs and it is expected that the training and instruction received will make both publications of more value to the school.

At the same time a conference will be held of the presidents and secretaries of the student body associations of the state. The local high school will be represented by Glen Radabaugh, president and Miss Vivian Orcutt, secretary. Miss Lewis will accompany the delegation as faculty advisor.

CHANGES IN BONUS LAW ARE PROPOSED

Several Amendments to State Bonus Act Are Proposed by Ex-Service Men Serving in the Legislature

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—Controversy has broken out in the Oregon legislature over proposed amendments to the soldiers' bonus law, with the bonus commission on one side and a group of ex-service men in and out of the house on the other. The ex-service men are largely backed up by the American Legion in their demands.

What the ex-service men want is an amendment to the law which will permit all of those who have received the cash bonus, but desire to repay it to the commission with interest, be entitled to the benefit of loans under the act. Ex-service men declare that thousands of those who took the cash bonus early in the game were virtually defrauded of their right to a loan by a ruling of the commission which held that loans could be made only for the purchase of a home. The supreme court upset this ruling, and according to the ex-service men, large numbers of those who took the cash bonus set up a vigorous protest, as they said they would not have accepted the cash had they known they could have used the loan for other purposes than home building.

The commission is vigorously opposed to the change proposed by the ex-service men, claiming that there is not enough money available to put the plan into operation if permitted.

Both sides of the argument are in favor of extending the cash bonus another year, the original act shutting it off, and additional legislation will be required to extend it.

A peculiar situation exists in the attitude of the two committees. The greater number of senate committee members, not having been in the war, are opposed to the ex-service men's demands to permit repayment of the cash bonus and take a loan instead, while practically all of the house committee members were in the war and practically all are a unit in favoring what the ex-service men want in that regard.

Numerous minor changes are desired by the commission in provisions relative to the operation of the law, the commission's object being to tighten up somewhat in an effort to safeguard the state's funds, while the ex-service men declare the people meant what they said when they extended the loan to them and want the cards played high, wide and handsome.

One important change in the old law which is agreed on by all is an amendment providing that it will be a felony to defraud the commission.

The Circuit Court decision given on the defendant's demurrer, held that the contract cannot be enforced in a court of equity as it is not mutual and calls for continuous supervision over an extended period of time.

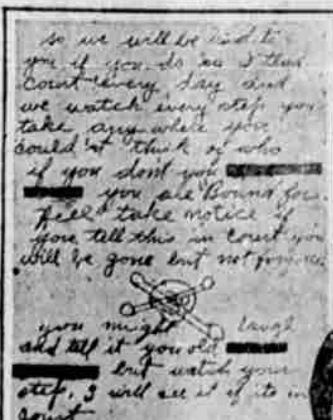

DEATH THREAT FOR HERRIN (ILLINOIS) WITNESS



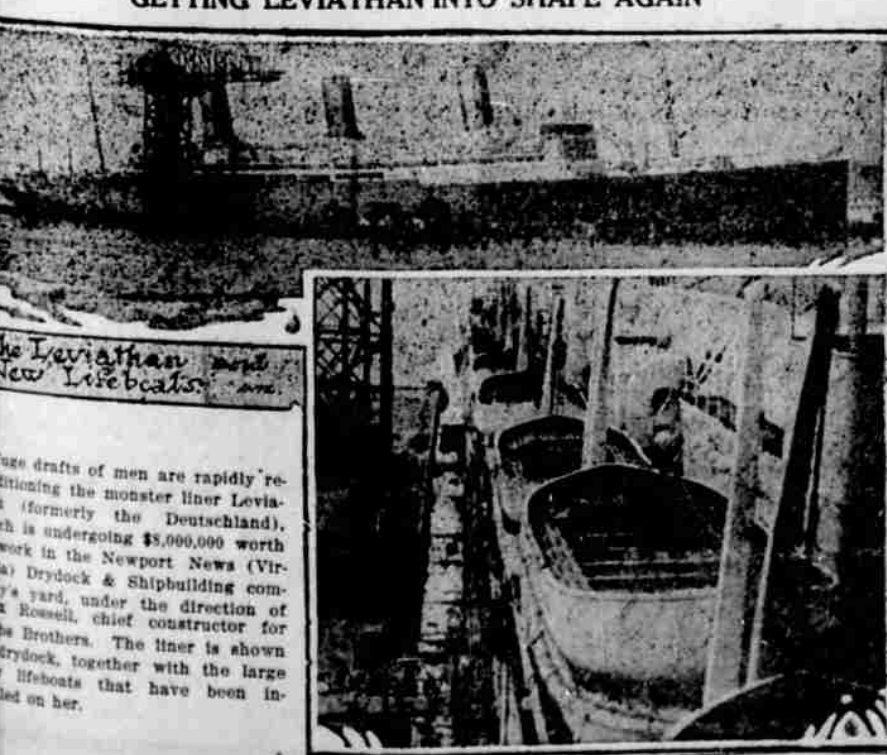

Charles Galli, a delivery boy, aided the defense by his testimony at the trials held in Marion, Illinois.
