the prohibition laws of Oregon, was
declared by Governor Pierce in an
address before the Six O'clock club
at the First Methodist church here
last night."In another part of Oregon last
fall I was started and saddened to
see the amount of drinking behind

very much concealed. I said to my-
self, 'If ever I get a chance to hit
that evil, I'll hit it hard.'""Already I have been strongly

son why the moonshine fad should

be cool, safe, sober brains and de-
