NOTORIOUS PAIR ROUTED BY POLICE

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Charlotte Poillon and her sister, Mrs. Katherine P. Smith—known to the police for a decade or more as the Poillon sisters—were routed from their beds in a fashionable upper West Side apartment early today and arrested on a charge of grand larceny preferred by Charles H. Dusenbury, 72, who says he was engaged to marry Katherine.

According to the complaint, Dusenbury sought the hand of Katherine, who is 51 years old and before she accepted, Charlotte told him she wanted proof of his ability to support her sister. Dusenbury thereupon produced stock certificates and bonds worth \$50,000 and the sister said they wanted to show them to her parents, who lived up state, Dusenbury consented and that was the last he saw of the certificates, he said.

After waiting a reasonable time he told the district attorney's office about it, an indictment resulted and a bench warrant was issued.

Episodes Figure in News

The sisters came to New York 24 years ago from their native city of Troy and since then they have figured frequently in the news.

Katherine got the first notoriety by knocking out a man who had spoken to her without an introduction as she was walking in Central park.

In 1902, Katherine brought suit for \$250,000 against William Gould Brokaw, alleged breach of promise to marry, but the case was settled for \$17,000 before it went to a jury. Then she sued her lawyers, alleged that they had taken too much of the settlement money.

In 1913, they were sent to Blackwell's Island for three months for defrauding a hotel out of \$30.

In 1915, they came into public notice again when it was found that the alleged German spy, Raymond Ralph Swoboda had lived in their apartment in Riverside Drive.

In 1920, they aided detectives in trapping a man who was charged with being implicated in the theft of jewelry from Enrico Caruso's home and received part of the \$10,000 reward for the recovery of the gems.

BIBLE SCHOOL CONVENTION OVER

The two-day Sunday school institute held in this city closed last night with an open meeting at the Presbyterian church. The institute was one of the most successful ever held in the county and was attended by delegates and Bible school officers and workers representing practically every Sunday school in the county. The convention was successful in every way and the team of state Bible school workers sent down from Portland conducted the conference sessions in a manner which will accomplish a great deal of lasting good. In closing the convention an announcement was made that the state convention will be held early in May and it is expected that a large delegation will be sent from this county.

WOULD SUBSTITUTE HUNTERS FOR BOUNTY

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—Representative Carsner, who has a bill in the house to do away with the payment of bounties on wild animals and allow each county to match state funds for the purpose of employing hunters in connection with the biological survey, expects to put in another one in the near future. This will provide that all fines collected for violation of the game laws go into the predatory animal fund of the state, to be used

for the purpose of destroying such animals, but not to apply to the destruction of rodents.

At present these fines are distributed half to the general fund of the county and half to the state game fund. While about \$29,000 a year are assessed in fines, some are remitted and some not collected, so that the total amount of money received each year is about \$15,000.

Carsner had received from figures from Malheur county today which show that the county paid out in bounties last year only about \$129 less than the tax collected on sheep, the animal the bounty law is specifically enforced to protect.

NEWS-REVIEW CIRCULATION WILL BE TOPIC

Roseburg is going up against the hardest game of the season and it is certainly too bad that the team is in danger of being handicapped. It is hoped that the boys are able to play but it is feared that the team will be short at least two of its first team men which will be a serious disadvantage.

THOUGHT DEAD, RETURNS

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 31.—George Toplet returned to his mother's home here today after an absence of 17 years. He ran away from home when he was 16 and enlisted in the navy. During the late war the mother received word that George had been killed in a naval engagement.

Toplet found a 16-year-old sister at his home he had never seen. She met him in response to his ring of the doorbell and was so suspicious of his tale that he was her brother that he was sent to a neighbor where the mother was calling to call her before admitting him. Toplet has a wife and baby in England and is going back to them shortly, he said.

YOUTH TRIES SUICIDE

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—George E. P. Roth, 18-year-old high school senior, today was in a hospital here, said by physicians to be near death from a bullet wound self-inflicted, because, he told his father, he had formed an unconquerable drug habit that had forced him from school and denied him the privilege of graduating with his class tomorrow.

He told his father that he had bought the drug from a youth who stood outside the high school and peddled to high school girls and boys.

Young Roth, according to hospital interests, tonight admitted that his story was untrue. Doctors, after a thorough examination, said they found no trace of drugs in the youth's system.
