NEW LOBBY MAY MAKE APPEARANCE

(By United Press)
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1.—A new lobby which has not yet made its appearance at either Olympia or Salem, may land on the legislative battlefield before the current sessions of the northwest legislatures have become history.

The new influence in the air lobby. In Utah the legislature has threatened to put a crisp aviation in that state by taking under consideration a bill inventing land-owners with the right of ownership in the air lying above their property.

While no restrictive legislation like this has been tried in Oregon or Washington, neither state is disposed to lift from the shoulders of aviation the burden of the gasoline tax. This tax, collected from all persons who buy gasoline, is enforced for aviators and motorists alike. Aviators claim that they do not use the highways, for the maintenance and extension of which the tax has been imposed. They maintain, therefore, that they should not be forced to pay for something they don't get and can't use. The phrasing of the Oregon motor vehicle laws would keep aviators from the highways even if they wanted to use them, they point out. The air cannot be worn out, they say, and hence there is no necessity for its maintenance. And its extent, so far as man knows, is infinite. Therefore there is no need for extension. So why, ask the flyers, is the road tax on the gasoline they use?

There is a probability that both Washington and Idaho will pass gasoline tax laws, possibly to conform with the Oregon law. At a recent meeting here, attended by about fifty pilots, plans for instituting commercial air routes between important northwest cities were discussed. These plans are far from mature, and, according to the aviators they will remain immature until they see what the lawmakers will do to relieve them from the burden of what they consider an unjust tax.

CONSIDER MATTERS CONCERNING FISHING

(By United Press)
SEATTLE, Washington, Feb. 1.—Within a few days, as soon as the desired legislation can be introduced into the Oregon and Washington legislatures, committees from the law-making bodies of those two states will meet here to consider a number of matters affecting the Pacific northwest fishing industry.

Uniform legislation is to be drafted along the following lines: Enforcement of the same citizenship requirements for licensed fishermen of the two states. Fishing license fees for gill-netters fishing in joint waters of the two states.

Changing the present method of taxation. Much has been done in both legislatures in past years, particularly during the sessions of two years ago and special sessions since, to protect the salmon industry and prevent for all time the use of purse seines in waters of this region. With the purse-seine question settled, still further regulation of legal fishing machinery and tackle is regarded as necessary.

In addition to the three major questions to be discussed by the joint committees, other matters bearing on this important phase of Pacific northwest industry are expected to make their appearance and to result in whatever legislation is found to be needed.

ship captains what to do for suffering sailors, copying of the prescription dictated over the telephone, and the sending of that again to the La Brea. Altogether, about 200 words were transmitted, or approximately \$40 worth of work done, for none of which was any charge made.

Radio stations on the Pacific Coast also handle free a large number of messages relating to detelicts and other menaces to navigation, weather reports and other matters tending to make the lot of the mariner less fraught with hardship and suffering. This traffic averages four or five thousand words a month through some stations.
