MEAT PRICE LOW, CLAIM

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Meats are now selling considerably below the level of other commodities as compared with prices prevailing before the war, John T. Russell, president of the national association of meat councils, announced here today after the completion of a survey.

"The latest retail figures of the United States bureau of labor statistics," Mr. Russell said, "those for December, show that sirloin steak, round steak, rib roast, chuck roast, plate beef, pork chops, bacon, ham and lard, averaged only 36 per cent higher than in 1913, whereas all articles of food combined as listed by the bureau, averaged 47 per cent higher, or 11 per cent above meats."
