VALUE OF USING SKIM MILK IN MAKING BREAD

What does skim milk do to bread? A commercial bakery in Grand Rapids, Michigan, tried using 118 barrels of liquid skim milk to the barrel of flour. They found in the first place that each barrel of flour with milk made 257 pounds of bread instead of 250 as without milk. Then the protein content of the bread was increased 11 per cent, the time 500 per cent, and its nutritive value was largely increased, notwithstanding the fact that the bread was moister. Moreover, this baker found that skim milk improved the flavor, palatability and keeping quality.

Most interesting of all from the baker's standpoint, skim milk so in-

creased the bread yield of the flour that milk bread cost no more than water bread.

If it costs the baker nothing to improve his bread with milk, and costs the consumer no more to buy milk bread than water bread, then what's to hinder us from manufacturing human brains and pep out of those billions of pounds of skim milk which have been going to waste?

Ice-cream is second in importance among the industries which use skim milk.—Country Gentleman.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

EXPLAIN POSITION OF STATE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Editor, News-Review, Roseburg, Oregon.

Dear Sir:

I have read with interest Mr. W. B. Ewing's letter that appeared in your columns January 25th, in which Mr. Ewing expressed his disapproval of the state development program outlined at our annual meeting, for the reason that it "Makes light of the issue of farm credit." For Mr. Ewing's benefit, and for the information of all others interested in future state development, we ask your indulgence for a few words on this subject.

Mr. Ewing has gained a mistaken impression if he believes that this organization fails to recognize the vital necessity of greater farm credit. No organization that is as close to the producers of this state as the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce could fail to recognize it. And the obtaining of adequate farm credit is one of the first problems recognized and provided for in the state development program outlined and adopted at our annual meeting.

We do not say that the marketing problem is greater than that of financing the farmer, or vice versa. As a matter of fact, as we see it, the marketing and farm credit problems are identical; they cannot be dealt with separately. In other words, better marketing facilities point the way to greater farm credit.

To explain our position, and at the same time clear up the mistaken impression that the state development program does not recognize the problem of better financing for the farmer, we will quote from the second paragraph of the adopted program (this subject was deemed to be of such importance that it was mentioned as practically the first step to be taken) as follows:

"Take up with the State Bankers Association and individual banks throughout Oregon, the work of furnishing to co-operative associations and companies the fundamental principles by conforming to which their commercial paper meets the usual standard required of banks from private and other business. Also take up with existing co-operatives the legal procedure involved in preparing themselves for handling through banks this class of commercial paper."

The fact that a successful marketing organization enables its members to obtain credit when it is most needed—on the same basis as any other industry which must show adequate assets and collateral to obtain credit—is borne out by the following extract from an address delivered by Mr. J. O. Holt, Manager of the highly successful Eugene Fruit Growers' Association, at our annual meeting:

"There is probably no safer collateral than the assets of a properly conducted co-operative, and they are becoming of such vast importance that money lenders are studying them as never before. These associations have the power to bring together the small lots of products from hundreds of producers, care for them intelligently and market them sanely. That, which when scattered over the country was of small value as collateral, when gathered together becomes a valuable asset."

Neither the state chamber, which will probably carry out the proposals embodied in the development program nor the Portland Chamber of Commerce, which is raising the funds to finance that development is blind to the fact that one of the farmers' first and most vital needs is for greater farm credit. But we do believe that the providing of greater marketing facilities offers the best solution to that need.
