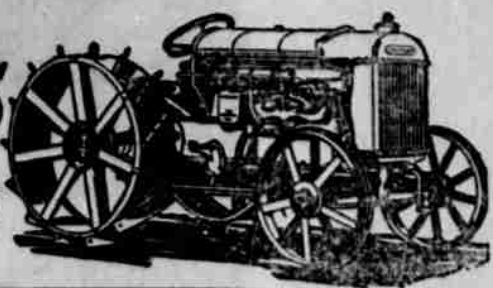

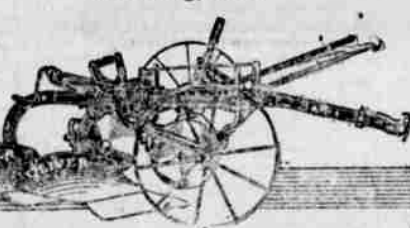

EDDY SAYS OREGON SCHOOLS SOCIALISTIC

SALEM, Feb. 6.—The doors of the high schools of Oregon have been thrown wide open to the teaching of Socialism under the guise of civics as now outlined in the course of study. Senator Eddy charged in the course of an argument before the senate this morning that Eddy was defending his bill which seeks to define certain studies as required of all high school students.

The bill, Eddy declares, was designed to give the high school student a more substantial foundation in the fundamental studies.

"The school people of this state have never been open to suggestions from the outside," Eddy charged, severely flaying the educators for their lack of practical ideas. "As a result our high school courses are not practical. Our high school graduates are deficient in the fundamentals. The professional educators of the state are opposed to this bill because they want the attempt on the part of this legislature to dictate this course of study."

Representing the opposition of the high school course of study Eddy pointed out the provisions for study of the works of H. G. Wells, Jack London and Scott Nearing all of whom were described by Eddy as authorities on the doctrine of Socialism.

Senator Clark opposed the bill as an unnecessary expense upon the school districts, declaring that its adoption would cost each district at least \$100,000. Teachers and dispirited by the measure, the debate began at 11:30 a. m. and was in progress all afternoon.

RELATIVE LOCAL PEOPLE IS DEAD

Word was received here this morning of the death of Jesse T. Thompson, an early resident of this county, and the grandfather of Mrs. O. J. Lindsay of Roseburg, and the brother of L. T. Thompson of this city. The deceased was 82 years of age and for the past 14 years has been afflicted with paralysis which has kept him bedfast.

He was born in Illinois and came to this county when a young man taking up land in the Coles Valley district where he resided until fifteen years ago when he went to Portland to reside with his daughter. Soon after moving to that city he was stricken with paralysis and was confined to his bed until death. He leaves a widow, one son, W. W. Thompson of Payette, Idaho; and four daughters, Mrs. W. H. Abee, Mrs. John Muir, Mrs. Harry Thompson and Mrs. L. J. Meem, all of Portland.

The deceased was also an uncle of S. D. Evans and Mrs. Edward F. Von Poppel. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the body will be placed in the vault at the Portland Crematorium.

THAT FIRST DOLLAR SAVED

Small Amount, of Course, but It Has a Value Far Beyond Its Intrinsic Worth.

It is a very common thing to hear a clever, capable man or woman accused of not knowing "the value of a dollar," or of not being able to "save a dollar."

Before you can make money you must first have a true appreciation of the value of \$1; not the value of \$1,000 or \$100,000, but the true value of \$1, says a writer in Thrift.

You have often heard the expression: "To him a dollar looks as large as a house." While this expression is usually applied to a person who is miserly, it would, nevertheless, be an excellent thing if every thrifty person would place a higher appreciation upon \$1.

The average person does not throw his earnings away in large sums. He wastes \$1 here and \$1 there in an unthinking manner.

Whatever has been accomplished by that man is largely due to the value he placed upon the first dollar he made.

LITTLE AFFECTED BY FILTH

Modern Race of Arabs Are Seemingly Immune From Generally Fatal Zymotic Diseases.

Northern Arabia is a land virtually destitute of lakes and streams, and during the dry season even the infrequent wells cannot be depended upon; so that the provision of a sufficient water is a primary consideration.

The Arabs carry their own drinking supply in large goatskins, two of which are usually slung under the belly of each camel, but the water in these, usually of doubtful origin, quickly acquires a taste which makes it almost undrinkable for Europeans.

When the supply in the goatskins runs low, it is replenished at the desert wells with water so inconceivably foul that no one but an Arab could drink it and live to tell about it. I imagine, however, that every Arab susceptible to zymotic diseases died thousands of years ago, and that by the law of the survival of the fittest, all Arabs born now are immune from filth diseases.

This is the only explanation of why they can drink sewage water with impunity, go for months at a time without bathing, wear garments which are caked with dirt and crawl with vermin, and thrive under conditions which would kill a white man in a week.—E. Alexander Powell in the Century Magazine.

"Flapper" Legislator Asks Rigid Laws



Miss Myrtle Caine, "flapper" legislator of St. Paul, Minnesota, with other women members of the legislature, is planning a campaign for the passage of bills and amendments providing for the granting of full rights and property privileges to illegitimate children. She also demands that children born out of wedlock shall have the right to the father's name and estate, equally with legitimate offspring. The measures are said to be the most revolutionary ever offered before an American law-making body and are believed to be strongly backed by public sentiment.

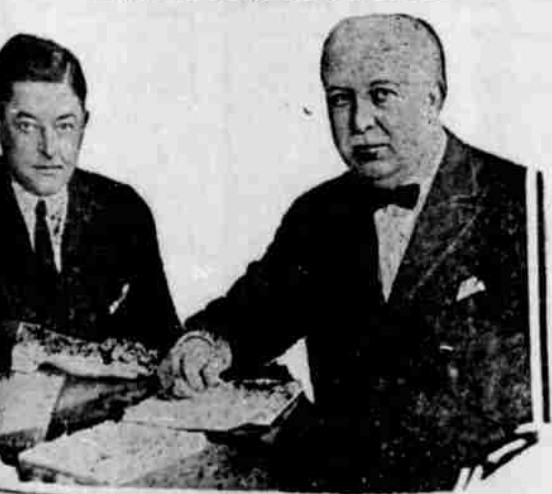
