A good turnout already has answered the call of Bill Hayward, veteran track coach, and with long wool "undies" adorning their legs to keep away the breezes, and sweat shirts flapping atop their sleeveless jerseys, is hard at work on the outdoor track when weather permits, and inside when Boreas and Jupe Peltus get too nasty.

TRAFFIC MONUMENTS TO BE READY SOON

The new dome shaped monuments recently adopted by the city council in lieu of the present unsightly and dangerous traffic guides, will be placed on the streets within a few more days, according to the report made by Mayor N. Rice to the city council last night. Considerable difficulty was experienced in obtaining a suitable mold and after this was secured it was possible to make only one monument at a time. The cold weather prevented further work with concrete and as a result only thirteen have been made up to the present time. These must be allowed to set and harden for thirty days before they will be ready for use and must also be painted. As soon as they are ready for use on the streets they will be substituted for the present monuments, Mayor Rice stated.

This spring, as usual, the feminine card athletes will compete with the M.M. College athletes and the California coeds. There are no Stanford women's "varsity" teams, but the class teams meet the corresponding class teams of the other institutions.

The meets with California have in the past been limited to swimming. In the future however, there may be some other fields of competition open to the women of the two institutions. Stanford women's teams in basketball and archery meet Mills College teams in those sports.

Swimming is the most popular of all sports among Stanford women, who enjoy that form of exercise all through the year. The other sports are seasonal. Archery and tennis are the popular fall and spring sports. Hockey is the main fall sport, with basketball occupying the co-eds during the winter.
