POWER OF GOSPEL FULLY MANIFESTED

Gospel Shows Power to Draw and Hold Interest of People—Evangelist Takes Text From Story of Jonah.

The Gospel has not lost its "Old Time Power" which was very manifest yesterday in the morning. Mrs. Price led the ten o'clock preparatory healing service. About 200 people were present, nearly all seeking healing.

At 2:30 Dr. Price preached on "The Gifts of the Spirit." His text is found in 1 Cor. 12:13-14. Briefly stated, the Dr. told us: "Spiritual things are spiritually discerned. No man can say that Jesus is Lord but by the Holy Ghost. In Mat. 16:17 Jesus said to Peter, 'Flesh and blood have not revealed it unto you.' The gifts of the Spirit are many and diverse but they are given by the same Spirit, who gives to every man severally, as He will. 1 Cor. 12:8-11." The story told of a friend, a young girl in Scotland was very stirring. Alice Barber is the daughter of a multi-millionaire there. Her mother died and her father took great pains in educating her. He sent her to Berlin to study music and at twenty-two she was ready to enter upon a musical career. But her father was an infidel, and did not allow her to go to Sunday school, or in any way hear about God. Just as she had finished her education, one day she went out for a walk and passing by a Methodist church, entered where she found Jesus. When her father learned this he gave her a week to recant. But she could not do so and leaving a note on her pillow to him, she left the home. She is now in London where Dr. Price saw her some time since with a Salvation Army bonnet on, standing on the street on a soap box preaching. Joy fills her life as she labors for Jesus.

The sermon of the evening was taken from the book of Jonah. The keynote of the sermon was, that as God called Jonah, it was no more possible for him to run away from the path of duty than it is for men of the present day and age. Wild oats may be sown but there is a reaping time coming. The case of an Oxford University man, an M. A. who fell so low through drink that he washed the cuspidors and swept the floor of a saloon for a living was cited. But "Earth has no sorrows that heaven cannot heal," Jesus can deliver from drink, dope and tobacco habits.

Rev. Birchett of the Presbyterian Mission Board, returned missionary from South America told how the Lord healed him of a rupture. He was advised by Dr. E. M. Dood of New York city to "have an operation, and not lose time." He went to Ashland for healing and was instantly delivered.

A Roseburg woman was healed yesterday of a cancer. She said she "just wanted to get up out of bed and run."

Dr. Price never takes money from anyone for healing. He does not claim to heal. Jesus does it. A Jewish doctor was unable to cure one of his patients so sent him to Dr. Price as he said only supernatural power could heal him. He was not a Christian but offered to pay \$1000 if Dr. Price would pray for him, which money was refused.

A preparatory service will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock when cards for the anointing service will be given out. Friday evening there will be an Evangelistic Service followed by the anointing service. The afternoon service begins at 2:30 and the evening service at 7:30.

Alexandria, Home of Washington Plans Big Celebration February 22

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Feb. 7.—(United Press.)—Alexandria is preparing to revive the spirit of colonial Virginia in giving one of the biggest parades in her history on Washington's birthday this year. This city has been chosen on account of the close relation of its history and that of "The Father of His Country."

All civic organizations of this quaint old city will participate in the parade, beside thousands who will come from all over the nation and the world. Military bands, civic bands and military companies will come from the any camps immediately surrounding the city and Washington. Governor E. Lee Trinkle, chief executive of the Old Dominion, will head the parade, accompanied by his guard of honor, a picked company of the famous Richmond Light Infantry Blues.

The parade will follow the course of the old streets over which George Washington traveled daily on his way to and from his office. It will pass beneath the shadow of the statue of the Father of the Nation, which is being built in his honor by his brothers in Masonry. More than 2,000,000 Masons of America have contributed to the fund for the building of this memorial upon the hill that was originally chosen as the site for the Capitol of the Nation. This plan, however, was abandoned upon Washington's objection, which was based upon the fact that he owned the land.

Christ Church is another of the historic points along the line of the parade. It was in this church that Washington worshipped and served as a vestryman.

Alexandria has been chosen as the place for the holding of this national celebration not only because of the very atmosphere of its historic setting lends solemnity to the occasion but also because of its ideal situation. Situated as it is mid-way between Washington and Mt. Vernon it is just half way between a nation's capital and a nation's shrine. Many times George Washington drilled his little companies of soldiers on the self-same cobblestoned streets the celebrators will trample as they make their solemn way in commemoration of his birth date.

For many years Alexandria has been famous because of its celebrations. The custom died down somewhat since the World War, but the committee in charge is confident that the parade to be held this February 22 will surpass all others in grandeur and extent and the town will be given over entirely to the celebrators. In addition to the public demonstrations, all Alexandrians will open wide their doors to visitors and show the old form of Colonial Virginia hospitality. Alexandria is also distinguished as being the home of the oldest daily newspaper in America. The Alexandria Gazette was established in 1784 and is just now starting its 138th year.

SIDELIGHTS OF ORE. LEGISLATURE

SALEM, Oregon, Feb. 6.—While bills are being introduced and disposed of, either dying at once or achieving a quasi-immortality by slipping onto the statute books, all sorts of pleasant things are happening in and around the house and senate. A banquet was recently given to the members of the legislature and to the newspapermen covering their activities. The tables were spread at the state hospital. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner the host. The joint game commission had a wonderful time in Portland at the Multnomah Anglers' Club banquet. And there have been the "in toto" junkets to Corvallis and Eugene, the latter on January 31, after a strenuous debate and decision that junkets are bad things. As Joe Singer, house factotum, would say; "there's only one thing easier than being a legislator, and that's being a lobbyist."

If there is anything in circumstantial evidence the Oregon house is better in many ways than the senate. They don't need to be prayed over so much. Colonel G. D. NEW PHILLIPS ROLE IS STUDY IN CONTRASTS

An interesting study in contrasts is accorded in the settings of "The World's A Stage," the vital picture written by Elinor Glyn, portraying the inside life of a screen actress in Hollywood, which comes to the Liberty Theatre tonight and tomorrow. The spectator is first introduced to a play within a play, Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" being enacted by a cheap, barnstorming troupe.
