**NEWSPAPER BILL FAILS TO OBTAIN REPORT**  
SALEM, Feb. 7.—The House Judiciary committee last night decided to report out without recommendation the Hurbert newspaper bill, one of the most drastic ever submitted to an Oregon legislature. It provides that whenever a newspaper prints a false statement it must immediately without cost print a statement in the same type, same heading and giving the same prominence as to the original statement. It also contains a number of other provisions. It is believed the bill has no chance whatever to pass the house.
