HEALING SERVICE VERY IMPRESSIVE

Armory Packed to Capacity
for Dr. Price Services
Last Night

FINE SINGING BY CHOIR

Many Afflicted Felt Power of
the Holy Spirit Last Night
at the Anointing Service
—Services Sunday

The healing service at the armory Friday evening was probably the most impressive and stirring religious service that Roseburg has ever been privileged to witness. The building was packed three-quarters of an hour before the time for service to begin and a great many people were turned away when all seats in the building were occupied. It was the greatest day thus far in the campaign.

The 10 o'clock "preparatory service" was led by Dr. Price and was a great blessing to all present. Dr. Price explained the grounds of faith in healing and the nature of individual faith necessary to receive what God has provided for every believer, namely, physical healing. The personal testimonies of those who had received cards and were to be prayed for in the evening service was most inspiring.

The 2:30 meeting was well attended and was opened with a song service, after which Miss Evelyn Carvell sang "Open My Eyes That I May See." The audience was inspired with the appeal and beauty of the solo. The evangelist took his text from the word "Walk," as found in the epistle to the Ephesians. He showed that the Christian life is a "walk with God," following in obedience whatever we are shown is God's will. We should walk circumspectly, "for the people of Roseburg are not reading the gospel according to Matthew, but they are reading the gospel according to you." The service closed with an altar call, and many responded to the invitation to reconsecrate themselves to God.

The evening "song service" began at 7 o'clock, led by the evangelist, who is a gifted musician and knows how to make the most of chorus and congregational singing. The singing last night certainly showed that the people of this city and community are, and anyone who failed to get a thrill out of that service has a great lack somewhere in his being.

Dr. Price took for his text the story of blind Bartimaeus, found in Mark 10:46, and the power of the grand old gospel held that great audience as they gave the closest attention to promises, precepts and illustrations of the evangelist's message. At the close of the preaching service there was an "altar call" and many gave their hearts to Christ.

Then came the anointing service. With the chorus singing softly the grand old hymns of our Christian faith, one after another of those to be anointed with oil and prayed for were brought to the platform. There was a sacred hush over that great throng, and we venture to say that many in the audience were brought closer to God than they have felt before.

Dr. Price took the card that each one brought and read the nature of their disability to be prayed for. Then, placing his finger on the forehead, and made the sign of the cross on the forehead, and then placing his hands on the head he prayed for the healing of the sufferer. Some of those prayed for were prostrated by the power of the Holy Spirit, which surged through their bodies, and lay unconscious on the platform; others were assisted to chairs, where they rested for a few moments, while others were able to stand the platform immediately. Dr. Price stated that he knew of a number of those prayed for were instantly healed, while others, he said, the healing had begun and would continue till the work of restoration to health was complete. One of those prayed for, a rapture, stated in the writer's hearing at the close of the service that every vestige of the thing had gone, the big lump had disappeared immediately. A very small child, carried in the arms of its mother, was prayed for, and Dr. Price asked the mother to take the child to a physician and have it examined and come back and report what the doctor says. About twenty persons in all were prayed for last night. The next healing service will probably be held on Tuesday evening next week. The services for tomorrow will begin at 11 o'clock in the morning, when Dr. Price will preach, and the railroad men who work on the afternoon and evening shift will have a chance to hear the evangelist. He will speak again at 2:30 and at 7:30 p. m. Everybody was asked by the evangelist to attend these Sabbath services.

HARRY HAGEL BUYS BLACKSMITH SHOP

An important business deal was completed today when Harry Hagel, formerly employed in the car department of the S. P. Company, purchased the blacksmithing and machine shop business conducted by Otto H. Hunt on Rose Street. Mr. Hagel is an expert mechanic and will be able to conduct the business in the same satisfactory manner as at present. Mr. Hunt who came to this city about a year ago expects to remain here for several months at least.

Mr. Hagel agrees to refrain from engaging in the blacksmith business in Roseburg for a period of years, but reserves the right to engage in the repair of automobiles, trucks, etc., and to do acetylene welding. WOERNLE CASE IS IN COURT OF APPEALS

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—Joseph Woernle, Portland attorney and Austrian consul for Oregon prior to the late World War, was branded a felon and a man unworthy of American citizenship before the United States circuit court of appeals here today by John S. Coke of Portland, United States district attorney for Oregon.

Coke argued the government's appeal from the decision of Federal Judge R. S. Bean of Portland, who held that the government had failed to produce evidence sufficient to warrant cancellation of the citizenship certificate given Woernle at South Ben, Wash., August 23, 1904.

The suit is based on fraud. The fraud charged is that Woernle's oath renouncing allegiance to Germany and declaring allegiance to the United States was false, in that he secretly reserved and kept allegiance to Germany. To support the last contention the government pointed to Woernle's abuse of his American citizenship by lending his naturalization papers to Hans W. Boehm, a German reserve officer, to the end that Boehm should travel through belligerent zones to Germany in the name and guise of Woernle, and thus enjoy the protection and rights of an American citizen.

His conduct was against ordinary decency, it was against his oath, against his duty to America and against the law, reads the brief which Coke filed with the court upon the completion of his argument. "He freely sacrificed America, and used all that America had given him, to aid Germany. He was willing to, and did, commit a felony—risked imprisonment in the penitentiary and attendant loss of his civil rights—to aid the country whose allegiance he had renounced."

"He admits that he knew as a lawyer, in 1914, that he was committing a felony. He was willing to expose the United States to such grave international embarrassments as might have resulted from finding a German military agent traveling in the guise of an American citizen, with a passport valid on its face, and regularly issued by the department of state, but in fact fraudulent because it was carried by Boehm and not by Woernle, and this with Woernle's connivance and aid."

PRESS BARRED FROM COMMITTEE ROOM

SALEM, Feb. 9.—Hereafter the distribution of the spoils at the disposal of the legislative ways and means committee is to be conducted in the dark and behind tightly barred doors. The taxpayers who foot the bills are to be denied even an inkling of the conspiracies and intrigues which surround the looting of the public purse.

For the first time in the history of the Oregon legislature the press, the eyes of the public which see all and tell most of it, have been barred from the important deliberations of the important committee which is charged with the dispensation of the state fund among the numerous and varied activities of the state government.

Led by Representative Brownell, recognized as the most liberal of the money dispensers, the committee last night by a vote of eleven to three, elected to exclude even the press from its sessions.

The motion of Brownell was the signal for a most vigorous and vociferous outburst of opposition on the part of the irreconcilable triumvirate—Senators LaFollett, Taylor and Zimmerman—at whose publicity seeking proclivities the blow was aimed.

For the cat came out of the bag when Representative Thorne in seconding the motion of Brownell declared the move to have been made in an effort to expedite the business of the committee by choking off the debates of certain members "who persisted in talking all the time for the benefit of the press."

RADIO LAWS APPLY TO MEDICAL COILS

The operation of high frequency medical coils interfering with radio reception, is in direct violation of the federal radio laws, according to a letter received this morning by Dr. George Honck, a local radio fan from O. R. Redfern, radio inspector for this district. There is a local high frequency coil which is causing local radio operators a great deal of trouble, and an inquiry was made of the inspector regarding its operation. In the majority of cases it has been found that this interference can be eliminated by means of a grounded shield but it is evident that nothing is being done here to stop the interruption of radio reception. Continued interference, will probably result in an inspector being brought here to make an investigation. The letter from the inspector follows:

Dear Sir:

Replying to your letter of February 6th, you are advised that the Department in a similar case as you refer to, has ruled that interference from high frequency medical instru-

ment is to be considered the same as interference from a Radio Trans-

mitter, and therefore in violation of the United States Radio laws.

A similar case at Woodburn, Ore-

gon, was taken care of by the doc-

tors operating the high frequency

machine, using their machine only

during the day.

A grounded shield around the in-

strument in some cases will elimi-

nate the interference.

ASSISTANT COUNTY AGENT APPOINTED

W. S. Carpenter, Formerly Crop
Specialist With O. A. C., to
Aid County in Work in
This County

W. S. Carpenter, formerly extension specialist in farm crops in the extension department of the Oregon Agricultural college, arrived here today with his family to serve as assistant to County Agent B. W. Cooney during the ensuing year. In addition to his work with the college, Mr. Carpenter has served as county agent in Sherman county and is thoroughly versed in all works of this kind.

When the county budget was formed it was decided to consolidate the office of county agent and county fruit inspector and the budget was adopted on this basis. The county agent is now authorized to employ an assistant who will carry on the club work, which has been neglected for several months, and also to do such field work as may be assigned by the county agent. Formerly the club work has been conducted through the school superintendent's office, the club worker also being school supervisor. By linking up the club work with the county agent's office it will be possible to connect the practical agricultural work of the county with the work done by the boys and girls and in this way a better hold will be kept on the young folks and they can be trained to a better advantage in farm work. The club activities will still be handled largely through the schools, as this is found an excellent method of keeping in touch with the youngsters and their accomplishments.

Mr. Carpenter is thoroughly versed in this line of endeavor and will be able to handle the club work in a very efficient manner. His training in farm crops will enable him to conduct many useful and helpful demonstrations for both the club workers and the more experienced farmers, and he will be able to give the county agent great assistance in this way. He is also horticulturally trained, so that he will be able to do much of the work which has formerly been done by the county fruit inspector.

The county agent now has charge of all of the agricultural and horticultural work in the county, and with the assistance of Mr. Carpenter will conduct many useful and helpful demonstrations for both the club workers and the more experienced farmers, and he will be able to give the county agent great assistance in this way. He is also horticulturally trained, so that he will be able to do much of the work which has formerly been done by the county fruit inspector.
