RADIO LECTURE ON ANCIENT PHAROAH

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Feb. 8.

(Special)—The opening of the tomb of Tutankhamen, involving as it does the discovery of the most brilliant collection of funeral equipment yet found in the hidden crypts of the Pharaohs, ranks among the most astounding revelations in the annals of archaeology, declared Prof. F. S. Dunn, professor of Latin in the University of Oregon, who delivered a lecture recently on "Tutankhamen Lives Again." The lecture was delivered over the radio and was heard by hundreds of Pacific Coast radio fans.

"The magic spell of Egypt has once again been cast over the world. We are momentarily awaiting the thrill that will attend the opening of that sealed rock chamber where presumably lies Pharaoh Tutankhamen," said Prof. Dunn. When the funeral cortege passed out of Thebes and across the Nile, bearing the dead Pharaoh to his catacomb, how strange a fantasy it would stumble upon the hidden crypt and reintroduce the mummified monarch to an astonished world. And could anything now be more weird than to await the coming forth from his tomb of an autocrat who wore the double crown of Egypt far back in the 18th century before Christ.

"A remarkable fate has befallen a relatively unimportant Pharaoh, in that the discovery of his tomb early in last November and the opening of the catachamber, some three weeks later, disclosing almost complete funeral paraphernalia to the probable value of half a hundred million dollars, rank among the most astounding revelations in the annals of archaeology. Tutankhamen himself, though far excelled in fame by the Pyramids and such heroic personalities as Sesostris, Thutmose, Amenhotep, or Ramesses, has survived 3000 posthumous years, suddenly to become an international figure."

"In his own day and in his own place in the accepted chronology as a king of the 18th dynasty, Tutankhamen can not be credited with having been a conspicuous success. History knows him as the illegitimate son of Amenhotep the Magnificent, and as successor, after a short interval, of the heretic and mystic Akhenaten, whose non-law he was. His short reign of eight years was a troublous one of reaction, and decadence. Finding under the domination of the priesthood, he was induced to restore the old worship which Akhenaten had so strictly to refine and reform; and incidentally restored the capital back to Thebes. By far the most interesting item connected with his name and reign is the suggestion recently advanced by Arthur Weigall that Tutankhamen and not Ramesses II is the real Pharaoh of the Oppression who taught the children of Israel to make bricks without straw."

"Numerous monuments bear witness to his name, for instance a lion of red granite now in the British museum shows the cartouches and royal signature of Tutankhamen; a letter on clay and in cuneiform addressed to him while still a courtier, and discovered at Tell-el-Amarna. Then there are the frescoed walls of the tomb of his Ethiopian viceroy, Hay, which depict Tutankhamen on his throne

and receiving both his governor's report and embassies of tributary peoples. And the marvelous ruins of Luxor are the most superb by reason of Tutankhamen's great colonnade on which are sculptured the scenes of his triumphant reception in Thebes, the most pretentious structure erected by an Pharaoh up to that time.

"The practice of burial in pyramids had long been abandoned by the Pharaohs and now the desolate chalk cliff walls on the west of the Nile had been preoccupied by the royal line and honeycombed with tombs in maze-like chambers excavated in the rock. And here it was that Tutankhamen eventually came to join his fathers. Remarkably good fortune has attended the search for these tombs in the Valley of Kings and tourists today may look upon the mummies of some of the most famous of the Pharaohs now lying in state in the museum at Gizeh."

A short time ago Dr. Philip A. Parsons, director of the School of Social Work of the University of Oregon, delivered a radio lecture on "Prison reform in the U. S." Letters were received from persons living in communities in widely-separated sections expressing their appreciation of the lecture service. A. J. O'Reilly, county club agent of the State of Idaho, Tain Falls, wrote that he could "hear clearly and distinctly every word of Dr. Parsons' lecture."

GENERAL SLASH MADE IN BUDGET

SALEM, Feb. 8.—Secrecy seems to have lent a sharper edge to the legislative pruning hook. Having kicked the press out Tuesday night the ways and means committee proceeded to clip an assortment of timates which appeared before that body for approval.

The Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, Oregon Tourist Information Bureau, Oregon state exhibit, state bonus commission, state board for vocational education and the state industrial accident commission were cut off at the pocket and turned adrift without a cent of state aid so far as the recommendation of the committee has any weight in influencing the action of the legislature as a whole.

The tourist association had asked for \$40,000 for its operations for the next two years, the tourist information bureau sought \$20,000, the state exhibit, \$20,000; the state board for vocational education, was asking for \$50,000, the bonus commission had a budget request of \$120,000, and the industrial accident commission was asked for \$198,755 in state aid.

In addition to these absolute denials the committee trimmed the state fair appropriation from the \$100,000 recommended by the budget commission, down to a bare \$75,000 which will be limited to the payment of premiums. The budget commission had already pared this budget request down from a total of \$236,500. The Pacific International Livestock Exposition which asked for \$75,000 was
