The game was staged on the local court and at the end of the regular game the count stood 13 all. In the additional five minutes of play the Eugeniens caught one in addition to three points made as the result of fouls called on their opponents. The second Eugene team was also winner by a count of 54 to 13 over Marcola.

A fast game was witnessed by a good-sized crowd and plenty of action was provided. A five-man offense and defense was used by both teams and to this is attributed the low score, according to Coach F. L. Grannis of the Eugene squad. Eight fouls were called during the contest, four on each team. Most of the scoring was from close under the baskets, only one long shot being effective, this by Coleman of the locals. Albany will be here Friday night as the next game on the Eugene schedule. The locals have already recorded a 26 to 5 win over the Albany quintet.
