INCOME TAX BILL BAFFLES WISEAGERS

Solons Are Unable to Get Head or Tail of Measure—Salaried Men Are Given a Jolt

SALEM, Feb. 11.—Members of the legislature are trying to make head or tail of the compromise income tax bill which has been introduced in the house and not yet printed. The impression gathered by such members as have attempted to interpret it is that it is an income tax on the man on a salary and the wage earner, but that it takes care of the business man.

A bill to impose an income tax on salaried men would be a more appropriate title for the bill, in the opinion of some members.

According to the interpretation of several members, the little home owner derives no benefit from the proposed tax. The bill provides for a deduction of not to exceed 6 per cent on a reasonable rental value on property used for business or professional purposes. The business man can take advantage of this, along with other deductions, but the man with a house cannot. A home is not a place of business and therefore the owner cannot place a reasonable rental value on it and deduct 6 per cent of that value.

Insofar as farmers are concerned, the farmer can place a rental value on his land and secure the 6 per cent deduction. The small home owner, or in fact any home owner, is deprived of this privilege.

The man with a home and a salaried job is caught going and coming, under this measure, if the provisions are correctly interpreted by some of the senators and representatives who have had an opportunity to scan the typewritten copy. Farmers and business men fare well enough, but the man who is paid wages or is on a salary is not protected. It has been frankly stated in the house of representatives, in informal discussions of the bill, that the motive of the measure is to "hook" professional and salaried people and make them contribute something like \$4,000,000 by means of an income tax.

There is also a growing opposition to the schedule which has been incorporated in the bill. The rate on individual incomes ranges from one per cent to 10 per cent. This is a higher percentage than is maintained elsewhere. Wisconsin's highest rate is 6 per cent, and the Oregon rate proposed is far in excess of Wisconsin, and even now there is a movement in Wisconsin to make a revision downward.

What will happen to the schedule when the bill gets on the floor of the house for debate no one can forecast. The schedule is considered excessive by many members and the home owner is not receiving a square deal, according to others.

It is probable that some one will be able to make a clear and lucid and simple interpretation of the measure in its present form it is likely to be the target for many members. The subject of an income tax has been given slight attention by the 90 legislators and a very limited number have had anything to do with the preparation of the measure now on the desk.

A canvass among members who

have endeavored to keep in touch with this legislation reveals the fact that scarcely any two of them agree on what the bill contains, nor are they of one mind on the interpretation of its vital clauses.
