REBEKAH AT THE WELL SERMON TEXT

Bible Story Used by Evangelist
In Presenting Message to Large
Audience at the Amory Last
Evening.

Those who were privileged to hear the wonderful sermon preached by Dr. Price at the amory Sunday evening listened to a masterpiece of Bible exposition. The evangelist took his text from the story of Rebekah at the well. As an introduction he explained that there have been three ages or dispensations in the history of man: the Age of the Father from Creation to Calvary; the Age of the Son from Calvary to Pentecost; the Age of the Holy Spirit from Pentecost through the present time. The Spirit of God inspired men in ancient times to record certain events that were shadows of future events, such as the story of the selecting of the bride-Rebekah for the bridegroom Isaac. Aged Abraham instructs his steward Eliezer to go back "to my country and to my people" and there select a bride for Isaac. Eliezer is a shadow or type of the Holy Spirit, who God has sent to earth to prepare a bride—the church for the bridegroom—Jesus Christ the Son of God and the "five wise virgins" are the Spirit filled Church, ready for their Lord.

Eliezer fearful that the young woman might not be willing to return with him to Isaac asks that if this be so should he take Isaac back to the old homeland, and Abraham strictly forbids this and the shadow is true to the Gospel that Christ came once to put away sin by sacrifice of himself, but will never repeat that sacrifice. Eliezer obeying Abraham's orders finds Rebekah at the well, asks her for a drink for himself and his camels. When she obeyed and he learned who she was he presented her with beautiful jewels. This is a picture of the Holy Spirit meeting the believer at Salvation and giving to the believer the jewelry of heaven, love, joy, peace and etc. When the betrothal arrangements had been made they "tarry ten days" before starting for Isaac's home. The disciples and the rest of that number of 120 tarry in the upper room for ten days until Pentecost when the Holy Spirit came and started to conduct the church to Jesus. Rebekah's relatives thought she might not want to go so soon but she said "I will go" and this is the response of every

true Christian heart today. The Evangelist drew quite a laugh when he described Rebekah riding on the camels, for he said he had ridden on them himself and they were a splendid shadow of troubles, but it is better for the Christian to ride over them. These as Rebekah nears her future home Isaac comes out to meet her and takes her to his home. This will be fulfilled when Jesus comes again. This brief outline presents in an imperfect way a sermon that held the large audience every moment of its delivery and the remarkable altar call that followed proved its power to touch hearts.

The Evangelist rested Monday afternoon but spoke again Monday evening on the subject of the shepherds watching their flocks and the angel messengers and their message. It was a sermon of beauty and power and brought out the thought that God has given man a divine revelation. Man needed this revelation, and the revelation is the "glad tidings to all people." Many came forward at close of service seeking salvation.

Today there was a preparatory service at ten o'clock and the Evangelist spoke at 2:30 and will speak again at 7:30 after which there will be an anointing service. The song service will begin at 7 o'clock and no seats in the choir will be reserved after that hour.

Tomorrow there will probably be a Healing Service in the afternoon, and in the evening the Evangelist will deliver his wonderful sermon on the second coming of Christ, this sermon has been given by request as often as three times in a single campaign. Don't miss this treat.

EDDY AND PIERCE CONFER ON BILL

Consolidation Plan Discussed at Meeting Today in Effort to Harmonize Views

AMENDMENT PROPOSED

Governor Wants Banking and Fish Commission Included in Consolidation Program

SALEM, Feb. 13.—Senator Eddy and Governor Pierce are to get together today and see if they can harmonize the views of the governor and the 17 senators on consolidation. This was the decision last night after the senators were in secret council for several hours.

Apparently the sticking points are the amendments proposed to senate bill 205 by the governor. This is the measure having the support of a majority of the senate. The amendments of the governor are to place the banking department in the consolidation program and also the commercial fish commission.

Little objection is made among the senators to the absorbing of the bank department in the bill, but there is some protest against the governor appointing the superintendent of banks. Members of the game commission are now removable by the governor "for the good of the service," but members of the fish commission can only be removed "for cause." The governor wants authority to remove fish commissioners as easily as he can dispatch members of the game commission. The fish lobby objects to the governor's idea, declaring there are a thousand reasons why the fish commission should not be included in the consolidation plan.

Governor Pierce's position on consolidation has been so unstable in the view of some senators, the governor being supposed to switch from one bill to another from day to day, that yesterday afternoon an attempt was made to have him sign a statement that he favored the Eddy-Garland bill, which is S. B. 205. The governor declined to commit himself.

The entire proceedings of the consolidation negotiations are now being veiled in mystery. The governor asked the senators not to discuss with the press the various phases of the conference and they are abiding by his injunction. This gentlemen's agreement to bottle up information was continued after the caucus of the senators tonight.

In the Eddy-Garland bill provision is made for but one industrial accident commissioner. There are now three—one representing the employers, one the employees, and one the public. The pay of these officers comes from the fees, and elimination of the representative of the employers or the employees is likely to cause trouble.

CANYON MT. GRADE IS OPEN TO TRAVEL

That the Canyon Creek road that has been closed to continuous traffic since last July, at which time the paving of the grade was started, will be open to travel without restrictions on and after Thursday, Feb. 15, was the statement of G. E. MacVicar, of the State Highway Service, who was in Roseburg this afternoon from Canyonville and points south. This will be welcome news to the traveling public, as this piece of paving has been a sort of nightmare to everybody using it.

Mr. MacVicar stated that he inspected the road this morning as far as Wolf Creek and Sexton Mountain, and at the summit of the latter place there were two feet of snow which made the going pretty slow. At the summit of Canyon Mountain, the divide between the South Umpqua and Cow Creek, which is an elevation of slightly less than 2000 feet, there was a foot and a half of snow.

With the opening of the road below Canyonville to continuous travel the highway the entire distance between Portland and the California line will be open to travel without restrictions, and with the exception of a few short sections damaged by the flood water some weeks ago, the road is in excellent condition.
