CELEBRATING EIGHTEENTH ANNIVERSARY

Rotary clubs in twenty-seven different nations during the present week will celebrate the eighteenth anniversary of Rotary International. This is the parent organization of which all Rotary Clubs are members. The anniversary occurs on Friday, February 23, but the entire week will be given over to a program of publicity that those not familiar with Rotary work may familiarize themselves with the good work being accomplished by this organization in all parts of the world.

A special program has been arranged by Roseburg Rotarians which will be carried out at their regular luncheon Thursday. Though but a year old the local club has taken up and carried into execution many important problems affecting the welfare of this city and its members are very enthusiastic concerning the good work already accomplished and the program already set in motion for 1923. January 15, 1923 Rotary International consisted of 1325 member clubs with more than 90,000 members scattered over every continent in 27 different countries. The first Rotary Club was formed February 23, 1905, in Chicago, and since then no Rotary Club organized has ever surrendered its charter or lapsed its membership. Rotary is not a mere luncheon club, it is a philosophy of life. It teaches the doctrine of service and Rotarians practice this doctrine in every activity of their daily lives. Rotary is not so much an organization as it is a great social movement. It has already found congenial soil among the diverse people of 27 nations. Rotary trains its members in community service and the clubs and individual members have helped in many commendable causes with both their time and their money. The boy problem is one of Rotary's fields of service. Last year there were 1,065 Rotary Clubs with Boys Work Committees. Boys Week originated with the Rotary Club of New York in 1920. In 1921, 11 Rotary clubs, and in 1922, more than 200 Rotary clubs sponsored such a week. In 1923, Boys Week will probably be held wherever there is a Rotary Club. The "Back-to-School" or "Stay-in-School" movement originated in 1919 with the Rotary Club of Blackwell, Oklahoma. Last year 115 Rotary clubs engaged in the movement. Ultimately, through the efforts of Rotary International, the movement will become a part of the community life of every country.

BECOMING A BUSINESS CAPITAL

The secret of growth which achieved the rapid development of many cities, is that those communities have made themselves a kind of business capital and center of trade for the surrounding country. From their earliest days they began to reach out into near by territory and were always trying to induce people to come in and buy goods there. They accomplished two results. They increased their retail trade, and added to the group of people who make their living in retail stores. And as people formed the habit of coming to that city, they acquired friendships in the town, they felt at home there, they grew attached to it. As time went on in many cases, these people in the outlying country who had been making such a city their trading center, felt a desire to change their residence, sometimes to secure special advantages for their children, sometimes to branch out in some new line of business or for other reasons. There would be a constant drift into that town of people from miles around who had come to look at the city as a desirable residence place, as the result of doing business there on pleasant terms for many years.

That tendency to flock into such centers existed through the period when people were dependent upon trains, trolley cars and teams for transportation. Now that they travel many more miles by automobile, an ambitious city can be made the business capital for a much larger area, and in so doing it becomes a center into which people drift for residence purposes from a much wider territory.

LOCAL DEBATERS ARE CHAMPIONS

District Debate Teams Go to Defeat Before Roseburg High School Teams

A FINE RECORD MADE

Roseburg School Is District Champion for Second Time and Now Hopes to Win State Honors

Although in athletics the Roseburg high school has suffered some severe reverses lately, the school is showing up well in other activities, particularly in debating, the local teams in their debates on Friday with Pleasant Hill and Eugene, having taken the Southern Willamette district championship for the second consecutive time. This is a distinguished honor and Roseburg has a right to be proud of this fine showing. The local debating teams have been victorious in all contests and in the last two, which were decisive in determining the championship of the district, unanimous decisions were won by both the affirmative and negative teams.

The Southern Willamette district comprises the schools of Douglas and Lane counties. In former years Eugene usually had a walk-away with the debate championship but for the last two years Roseburg has won the laurels.

Last year the Roseburg debaters also took the Coos and Curry county districts into camp but lost to Grants Pass.

Having won the district championship the Roseburg team now enters the inter-district contest and will meet the winners from other districts in an effort to determine the state championship.

During the district contests the question debated has been in reference to the Oregon Primary law. The state question will take up the advantages and disadvantages of the Ship Subsidy measure.

Roseburg's affirmative team has been composed of Ethel Marks and Paul Geddes, and the negative team Harvey Roser and Paul Trueblood. Two of these debaters will be selected to make up the state team.

The local debaters have been under the coaching of E. W. Wolfe, instructor in History and Spanish, in the local high school. His excellent ability as a coach is shown in the fact that the Roseburg debaters have obtained such surprising success in spite of the fact that none of the members of the team had any previous experience in this line. Much of the interest in debate is due to the interclass debates, which the school holds during the first part of the school year.

LAW ENFORCEMENT ADVOCATES COMING

The Flying Squadron Foundation will be in Roseburg next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Feb. 20, 21, 22. They will have afternoon and evening meetings in the Baptist church. The Flying Squadron is a group of speakers engaged in a nation-wide campaign. Their headquarters are at Indianapolis, Ind. The topics discussed are Law Enforcement, Civic Righteousness and Social and Industrial Justice. The fundamental cause of high taxes will also be discussed. The movement is wholly non-partisan, the object being to arouse the public to the imperative need of immediate action in order to save our prohibition laws from the assaults being made on them by the liquor interests. There is no more important.
