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TOM SKEYHILL IS TO LECTURE HERE

Tom Skeyhill, intrepid Australian soldier-poet, will be welcomed by hundreds of friends and admirers on March 6th, when he will give his lecture in the high school auditorium on "Europe of 1923." Since Skeyhill's last visit in Roseburg he has again visited Europe and Asia, gaining material for one of the most startling and interesting lectures ever given on the American lecture platform. When Skeyhill decided to start on his momentous trip he was warned of numerous dangers and unpleasantnesses that would probably fall to his lot. He smiled and shrugged his shoulders.

The first fly in his ointment came when he tried to obtain a passport to Russia, and was flatly refused by the Soviet government.

"Oh, very well," said the adventurous Skeyhill. "I'll go anyway!" And he did. Forging his Russian passport in Finland, he traveled over the frozen gulf of Finland to Petrograd, passing himself off as a Norwegian architect. He lived with the Russian peasant, acquainting himself first hand with the sufferings and privations of the Russian people under the Bolshevik regime. Ill and half-starved, Skeyhill finally managed to get out of Russia after six harrowing months in that "land of nightmare."

His adventures in other out-of-the-way corners of Europe were also full of exciting details. Everywhere he studied conditions as they are, not as they are given out to the Press. Now he has returned to America to give the American people first hand the results of his investigations. Those who have heard the eloquence of this soldier-poet, need not be told of the treat awaiting them on March 6th. Skeyhill's lecture will be the fourth number of the Roseburg Lyceum course for this season, and those who do not hold season tickets are advised to procure their tickets early, as the seating capacity of the auditorium is limited.

TWO OIL BILLS HAVE BEEN PASSED

Two oil land bills of extreme importance to this section of the state have been passed by both the senate and the house of the Oregon Legislature. Senate Bill 106 concerning liens provides that no liens can be filed against land for oil or gas operations for labor, material and machinery. Senate Bill 124 provides oil and gas regulations such as casing against water, plugging abandoned holes, etc. This bill is a copy of the Oklahoma law. Both are preventative measures protecting the land owner in the event oil is struck in the state.

ACCIDENTS AT R. R. CROSSINGS FEWER

The number of fatalities resulting from accidents to automobiles at grade crossings on Southern Pacific lines, Pacific System, was reduced 7 per cent in 1932 as compared with 1931, according to a report just made public by R. J. Clancy, Assistant to the General Manager. There was a decrease of 10 per cent in the number of grade crossing accidents per 1000 registered automobiles.

The decrease is attributed to the cooperation of the press, automobile clubs, schools, churches and chambers of commerce with the Southern Pacific Company.

The number of registered automobiles in the six states traversed by Southern Pacific lines increased from 883,945 in 1931, to 1,115,945 in 1932. With an increase of 25.5 per cent in the number of registered automobiles, as a result of this cooperative effort there was a 10 per cent decrease in accidents per 1000 registered automobiles.

There were 552 accidents in 1932 compared with 610 in 1931, resulting in 53 deaths and 316 injuries compared with 57 deaths and 283 injuries in 1931. There was a reduction in 1932 of 7 per cent in the number of fatalities while the increase in the number injured is relatively less than the increase in the number of licensed machines.

The greatest number of grade crossing accidents occur from automobiles running on railroad tracks directly in front of approaching trains. The report shows that 450 of the accidents resulted from this cause, while 230 machines ran into the sides of trains, 121 stalled on the tracks and were struck by trains, 30 skidded into the side of trains, 76 ran into and broke down crossing gates and 8 ran down and injured crossing flagmen while warning them of danger from approaching trains.

Chief among the principal causes of grade crossing accidents are: failure of motorists to heed warning signals, carelessness or recklessness, failure to look in both directions and listen before attempting to cross railroad tracks, inexperience of drivers resulting in stalled engines while attempting to shift gears, defective brakes, attaining a momentum approaching a railroad track beyond the braking power of their machines if necessary to stop, and mind distracted by conversation with other occupants of the machine at the critical time of crossing railroad tracks. doubt a mistake in pressing accelerator when intending to press brake has occasioned some of the accidents involving skidding or running into trains and skidding through and breaking down crossing gates.

Danger in crossing railroad tracks at grade is inherently artificial in that it is a danger created by the driver in not exercising a reasonable degree

of precaution. The essential thing is for drivers of automobiles to stop, look and listen and never attempt to shift gears while on or immediately approaching the tracks, as it is when gears are shifted that machine is liable to stall.

GROUP TRIAL PLAN MEETS DISAPPROVAL

SALEM, Feb. 19.—The senate refused to approve the Moser-Joseph-Eddy bill providing for the trial en masse of persons charged with complicity in the same crime involving an infraction of the syndicalism act, Friday afternoon.

Senator Upton declared that the bill was necessary in order to protect Klamath county from members of the I. W. W. who deliberately committed these crimes in order to get themselves thrown into jail and run up huge expenses against the county by demanding separate trials and clogging up the jails and the courts.

"If the people of Klamath county

are not given the means for dealing with these people through the courts they will be compelled to deal with them with clubs and pitchforks and shotguns," Upton declared.

Senator Strayer opposed the bill as establishing a dangerous precedent and abrogating the rights of separate trial guaranteed to every person under the constitution.
