SALEM, Feb. 19.—To Senator B. L. Eddy of Douglas county, opponent of Senator Jay Upton's recent candidacy for president of the present state senate, was delegated the duty of presenting to President Upton the appreciation of the senate for Upton's work as presiding officer.

At the conclusion of a cleverly turned speech by Eddy a silver tea service was presented to President Upton.

Next Senator Garland arose and, on behalf of the Spanish War veterans, presented to President Upton a gavel of walnut wood. It came from the home of Col. J. M. Poorman of Woodburn, who was president Upton's commanding officer in the Philippines and who is now assistant doorkeeper of the senate. The walnut tree from which the wood was taken was planted forty years ago.

In presenting the senate's token, the silver tea set, Senator Eddy asked the floor on personal privilege.

"At the close of this forty days that you have presided over this senate," said Senator Eddy, "it becomes my duty to remind you that you have wielded the gavel in such a way during these weeks as to arouse a conspiracy among the members of the senate.

EMPLOYERS MUST GIVE INFORMATION

PORTLAND, Feb. 19.—Every employer is required under the provisions of the federal income tax to report not later than March 15 to the commissioner of internal revenue at Washington the name and address of every employee to whom during the year 1922 he paid \$1000 or more in wages, salaries, commissions, or compensation in any other form.

This information is used by officers of the internal revenue department as a check against the returns filed by individuals as to the accuracy and completeness of income actually received and reported by the taxpayer.

In view of the fact that the blanks upon which these salaries or wages of \$1000 or more is reported to the commissioner of internal revenue by employers does not indicate whether or not the employee is married or single, taxpayers having the status of a married man or woman frequently are asked to define their status subsequent to filing their return.

Every taxpayer who in 1922 received salary or wages of \$1000 or more from any one employer can evade the probability of thus being checked up by filing individual income tax returns wherein they can show their status as to being married or unmarried and thereby justify the amount of exemption they claim. This will relieve the married man or woman or the person claiming exemption as head of a family from the probable annoyance of being subsequently checked by deputies from the internal revenue office. For this reason many employers are filing returns although not liable to the payment of a tax, reports Clyde G. Huntley, collector of internal revenue.

EDDY AND JOSEPH IN COLUMBUS DAY FIGHT

Senator Joseph announced to the committee that he would make a fight against the passage of the Lewis measure on the floor of the senate when it came up.
