## COUNTY IS PEEVED AT BOOZE RUNNERS

BELLINGHAM, Washington, Feb. 20.—(United Press.)—Taxpayers of Whatcom county think they have a right to be peevish. The Peeve is the result of whiskey-running across the border.

Whatcom, being a border county, its agents out in on much of the booze-running south from the Canadian line into Washington. Prohibition officers declare that more booze is run through Whatcom than through any other county in the state.

In booze and narcotic smuggling cases, the county must pay all the costs of detection and trial, except where the accused is convicted and must stand all the expense of prosecution. The latter occasion, however, is rare.

Two main highways and two passenger railroads enter the county from British Columbia. As Vancouver is a sort of base for the whiskey-running gentry, it is easier to try to go through Whatcom than through Stevens county, the only other Washington county with a trunk international railroad. The roads through Stevens county are not as good for whiskey caravans as those through Whatcom. It is pretty hard on Whatcom.

Some wag has suggested that all counties bordering on Canada and all bordering on Mexico, where the Whatcom situation prevails, organize for mutual defense and force somebody else to stand the burden of stemming the booze flood. ### S. P. CONSCIENCE FUND INCREASING

Contributions to the "conscience" fund of the Southern Pacific Company, ranging in amounts from one cent to \$200, totaled 303.47 for 1922 according to a report just issued by the railroad. This is the largest yearly contribution to this fund since its establishment in 1907, the report stated. From 1907 to 1922 inclusive, a total of \$1468.14 has been remitted to the company by persons obeying the dictates of their conscience.

A majority of the remittances have been made to cover rides on freight trains. There are many other varied and interesting fraudulent dealings related and in practically every incident it is mentioned that this squaring of accounts has been prompted through the desire to uphold religious belief.

"I was overpaid one cent on my paycheck and as an honest employee I return it," was the explanation accompanying the smallest remittance. The largest sum, \$200, came from a religious source at Ogden, Utah. The amount had been turned in to the church as "conscience money."

Six cents in postage stamps was sent "from a child who failed to pay fare" and one dollar was remitted by a former employe who acknowledged "filching a small amount of money on storage, etc. some years ago while agent for the company."

## GERMANY GRABBING ORIENTAL MARKETS

TOKYO. (By mail to United Press).—German trade and shipping are rapidly regaining in Japan, and all the Far East, the position lost during and after the world war.

German goods of all kinds now abound in every market from Singapore to Siberia. German merchantmen and passenger boats are plying regularly between Hamburg and Bremen and all Far Eastern ports.

Whatever troubles Germany may be having at home and in Europe, she is sitting pretty in the Orient, and staging a spectacularly successful trade comeback.

The Japanese have always been rather partial to Germany—America coming first and Germany second in Japanese favor—and the German trade revival is well-nigh complete. It means Germany is cutting sharply into Japan's South Sea markets. German goods are now also competing with British all through the Straits Settlements, parts of India, and even more in China. American trade in the Orient is, so far, less affected than Japanese or British, by the German revival.

Germany has recovered trade ground so rapidly in Japan that German imports to this country now surpass, in value, those of pre-war days. However, since all values are higher now than before the war, this does not mean Germany is now sending to Japan more actual quantities of goods than in the pre-war period. But, if the present growth continues, she will be doing so in time.
