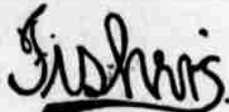

CORN SHOW WILL START THURSDAY

Exhibits of Crops Grown in Douglas County to Be Seen at Lockwood Salesroom

LECTURES ARE PLANNED

Interesting Night Meetings Arranged and Growers of Corn and Potatoes Are Urged to Attend

The Douglas County Corn and Potato Show, arranged by County Agent B. W. Cooney, will open tomorrow and several interesting sessions are expected during the three days the show will be in progress. The meetings are not being planned for the purpose of making a great display or for any unusual entertainment. They are being held rather to show that Douglas County can produce corn and potatoes equal to any part of the country and to interest farmers in giving more attention to these two staple products.

A large number of exhibits have been received from various parts of the county and these will be placed on display at the salesroom of the Lockwood Motor Company which is cooperating in this enterprise.

Judging of the exhibits will take place tomorrow and prizes will be awarded. Some very valuable prizes are to be given for the various classes introduced. The exhibits will be open to the public during the day and everyone interested is invited to look at the display, which will show the crops which can be produced in the county.

On each evening special lectures will be given which will be the main points of interest of the show. Thursday night County Agent Cooney will take up the production of corn, dealing with the various details surrounding the production of the corn crop, particularly corn judging and seed selection.

On Friday night Prof. W. S. Carpenter will speak on potato diseases and production. His talk will be illustrated by lantern slides from the Oregon Agricultural College and special charts which will be of great interest to all persons actively engaged in the growing of potatoes.

On Saturday night F. E. Price, extension specialist of drainage and irrigation, from the Oregon Agricultural College, will discuss the vital part played by drainage and proper fertilization in the production of crops, particularly potatoes and corn.

These talks will be very interesting.
