LEGISLATURE TO END SESSION TODAY

(By United Press.)

SALEM, Feb. 22.—The house this morning passed House bill 412 providing a five per cent tax on the gross income derived by persons, firms or corporations for leasing or renting motion picture films in Oregon, regarding it as a revenue producing bill of value. The house started the consideration of the income tax bill. The senate this morning repassed a bill creating a state finance commission. The bill had been recalled from the governor for amendment. The Astoria relief, income tax and consolidation bill are creating excitement as what is believed the last day of the legislative sessions swings towards a close.

Dennis Bill is Killed.

SALEM, Feb. 22. (A. P.)—The house today killed the Dennis 10 per cent tax reduction bill. The senate killed the Carner bill introduced at the request of the Oregon Wool Growers association, providing a hunter system for destroying predatory animals. The senate killed a resolution for introducing bills 30 days before legislative opens. The senate in a committee of a whole is today considering the consolidation bill.

The house is considering the income tax bill which was passed late yesterday.
