He showed that Armour & Co. did not pay a cent of tax on \$20,000,000.

He showed where one poor woman paid a \$13 tax on a sewing machine by which she was earning her living, while a big brewing corporation in the same place of millions of dollars did not pay one cent of tax. One day congress threw off \$450,000,000 on profiteers, and the next day after that threw off \$90,000,000 more, and then the day following Mr. Calder placed in a bill to restore light wine and beer to pay the soldier boy a bonus. When the bonus could have easily been raised on the amount thrown off.

PLEA FOR AN "ONION WEEK"

VENTRILLOQUISM AN OLD ART

Trick Was Well Known to the Ancient Greeks, and Word is of Latin Origin.

Ventriloquism is an art or power acquired through long practice, although some people seem to have a natural gift in that direction. It was known to the ancient Greeks, and the name comes from the Latin, "venter," "to quit." It is a method of speaking so that the voice seems to come from a distance, or from some other source than the person who is really speaking.

The vocal organs—tongue, palate, larynx, etc., are employed, but the ventriloquist, through practice, is able to speak with lips scarcely moving. To do this he leaves his lips slightly open and substitutes some letters for others—never using the labial or lip letters such as m, p, b, etc., but instead, saying "n" (formed with the tongue on the roof of the mouth), for "m" (formed with the lips), and "d" and "t" for "p" and "b." In this manner he would say "nan" instead of "man," and "day" for "bay," "tuy" for "pay."

According to one authority, besides tricks of speaking and various devices to distract the attention of an audience, the whole art of a ventriloquist is simply to draw a long breath and let it out gradually, while speaking, modifying and decreasing the sound of his voice.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Reverence for Name of Mary.

The Irish showed their reverence for the name of Mary by having two different words for it; one of which they used in referring to the Blessed Virgin, the other when any other woman was the bearer of it. Maol-Mhuire, or the servant Mary, was, however, a name frequently given to children in ancient Ireland. In its Anglicized form it is scarcely recognizable, the Ave Maria notes. Such names as Meyer, Miles, Murray and Gilmore are supposed to have been originally either Maol-Mhuire, the servant of Mary, or MacGuolla-Mhuire, the son of the servant of Mary.

Like the Hebrews, Greeks and other antique races, the ancient Irish had nothing to correspond to the modern surname. It was not till the thirteenth century that surnames began to be used in all parts of Ireland. When it is transformed into a family name Maol-Mhuire, the servant of Mary, became O'Maol-Mhuire.

MANY VARIETIES OF HATBAND

History Shows That Particular Ornamentation Has Been Worn Since Long Before Christian Era.

From the descriptions discovered on the walls of ancient temples it is apparent that, as far back as 3500 B. C., Egyptian women used a band with streamers to fasten their hair, tying this in a bow at the back or side. This style was retained by many people, through many centuries, and in the fourteenth century it was used as a "flet"—merely a straight band without streamers, which held the hair away from the forehead and the eyes.

It was this flet which gave rise to the streamered headresses which were much in vogue during the reign of James I, when, one reads, "Endymion Porter wore his wife's diamond necklace on his hat during a tour in Spain, but it appeared like paste beside the gorgeousness of the duke of Buckingham, who wore the 'Mirror of France' (the finest diamond in England) with a little black feather on the side of his hat."

This passion for expensive headgear passed with the waning of the styles of bright colors in men's clothing—but the hatband was retained because of its decorative quality, and because men have become accustomed, through thousands of years, to seeing it worn in one form or another.

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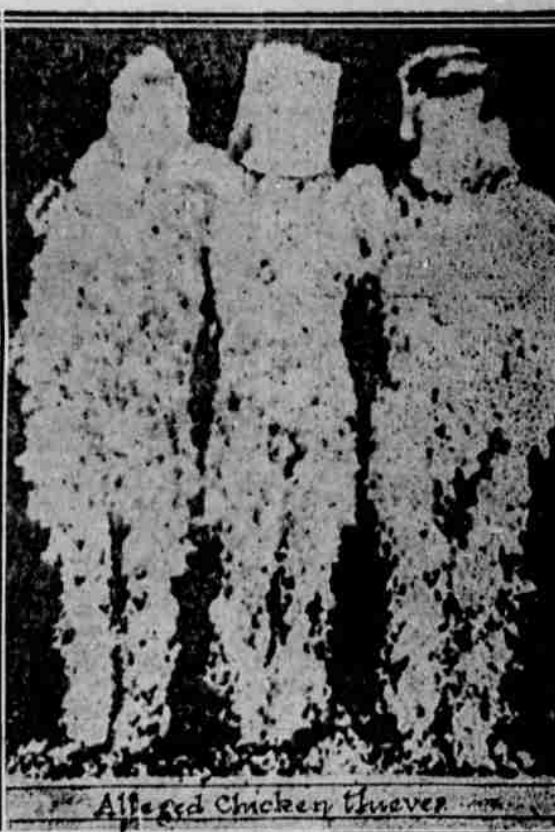
