The record, however, has been in good condition at all times.

The value of those links is shown by the fact that lovers of the sport will come for many miles to spend the day here and it is certain that the course will draw a great many tourists during the coming summer.

Mr. Price and Mr. Ormandy went around the course with W. J. Weaver, of the Umpqua hotel, and Attorney J. O. Watson. Mr. Watson and Mr. Price were "buddies" during the Spanish-American war and are great friends.

R. W. (Dick) Price, manager of the Multnomah hotel, Portland, and also manager of the Crater Lake lodge, accompanied by J. A. Ormandy, assistant general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, were in Medford today, greeting their many friends and causing an eye on local conditions in general.
