KNOX CASE BEFORE THE GRAND JURY

(By United Press)
HEMPHIS, Tenn., Mar. 1.—"Will they meet Lady Bountiful?" This question being discussed as the Sabine county jury was called to convene here in March to consider the case of Mrs. Lillian Knox, bound to the jury on a charge of murder in connection with the death of her husband, James Knox, wealthy East Texas lumberman.

Knox was found dying from a bullet wound in the back of his head. Nearby was a pistol.

In the preliminary hearing, the defense contended that Knox took his own life. Letters, addressed to his wife and mother and purporting to have been written by him, were found in pockets of the lumberman's clothing after his death. He had been drinking heavily, it was testified, and in an effort to forget his financial troubles. Other testimony was introduced to the effect that Knox had made the statement that unless conditions improved, he was "going to end it all."

The prosecution, however, branded the letters forgeries. They were typewritten.

The defense introduced but few witnesses in the preliminary hearing while the prosecution presented a great deal of evidence.

No powder burns.

Dr. W. T. Arnold, the family physician, who viewed the body soon after the shooting occurred, testified that there were no powder burns. The state held that had Knox shot himself there would have been some marks. Sheriff George Alford substantiated the state's contention when he testified that he had tested the gun which was found and that it produced burns on sheepskin, when discharged at a distance of six inches.

An empty vial was produced. The vial was similar according to the testimony of a druggist, to one containing a quantity of powerful sleeping potion, which was sold to E. T. Carson, Mrs. Knox's secretary, the day prior to the tragedy. That Knox was drugged and then shot while in the "attitude of sleep" was one of the theories held by the state. This is the belief of the mother of Knox.

Other testimony which the state announced it would trace, was that a large automobile was seen speeding toward San Augustine about the time of Knox's death. Details regarding this car and the driver are expected to be brought out at the grand jury hearing.

Footprints were found under a window of the bathroom adjoining Knox's bedroom, it was disclosed.

At the preliminary hearing it was brought out that, a few days before death, Knox had decided all of his estate to his wife. The defense held that it disproved a theory of the prosecution that Knox was killed by persons desiring his wealth.

The character of the attractive widow who earned the title of "Lady Bountiful" by her benevolence to the poor of the surrounding, will have a bearing on the case, in the opinion of residents.

She is noted both for her kind deeds and her temper. Her servants loved and feared her.

During the last epidemic of influenza, she personally went to the homes of her employees and took care of the stricken members of their families. The poor were always cared for. A man wanting work could always get it by applying to her.

DEPUTY CROWER DIES AT EUGENE

According to word received here today, Deputy Sheriff George Crower, of Lane county, well known here, died Tuesday night. Mr. Crower had been in Roseburg on many occasions in his official capacity and is one of the best known deputy sheriffs in the state. He served in Eugene as a peace officer for more than thirty years and was a faithful and conscientious officer at all times. The Eugene Guard speaks of Mr. Crower's death as follows:

After an illness of a month or so, and while seemingly well on the road to recovery, George P. Crower, Lane county deputy sheriff and veteran peace officer, passed away at his home here about 11 o'clock Tuesday night. Death came while relatives were gone from the house for a few minutes. He passed away quietly in his chair, as did his sister, Fannie, several months ago. Death was due to a heart attack.

Deceased, who was born in Eugene 65 years ago, on March 28, was the son of C. C. Crower, early Lane settler. He had served as city policeman and as deputy sheriff under James C. Parker, Fred Pink, Harry L. Brown and Fred G. Stickney, during that time he had built a reputation as a fearless officer and a terror to evil-doers.

His wife, an only son, Charles, and a brother, Charles F., survive.

Funeral services will be held at the Vetch chapel Thursday afternoon, March 1, at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Mr. Frederick G. Jennings of St. Mary's Episcopal church, officiating. Interment will be made in the Masonic cemetery.

GOVERNOR VEToes CARKIN ROAD BILL

SALEM, Feb. 28.—The Carkin bill—house bill 254—amending the law relating to road taxes was vetoed by Governor Pierce this morning.

This bill is entirely in the interests of incorporated cities," the governor points out in his veto message. "If this bill were to become a law one-half of all money collected in all the cities of Oregon for road work would have to be spent within the cities. There is a statute that allows co-operation between the county courts and incorporated cities but the advantage is always in favor of the city."

This bill if it were to become a law would seriously curtail the building of county roads. Oregon has spent millions of dollars building highways most of it for the benefit of the cities. It seems to me that the general policy now should be to improve the market roads and sell upon the cities to help in doing that work as they are doing now through the operation of existing laws."

Two bills were signed by the governor today—house bills 435 and 436, both ways and means committee bills—one appropriating money for the board of control and the state budget commission, the other appropriating money for the state fair.

AVIATOR CONTRACTS TO PATROL TIMBER

SPOKANE, Wash., March 1.—What is believed here to be the first private contract ever made for aerial forest patrol has been entered into by N. H. Namer, Spokane air pilot, and the Potlatch timber protective association.

The protective association has made arrangements with Pilot Namer to patrol its holdings near Novell, Idaho. To fulfill the contract, Namer must fly about 500 miles a day from June 1 to September 15.

Two new planes, equipped with Hispano-Suiza 150-horse power motors, will be used in the patrol work, according to Namer. "The planes will be equipped differently from any now in use," added Namer. "Both will be equipped with radio sending apparatus, by use of which we will be able to tell headquarters at once the exact location and size of any fire."

"Only one ship will be in the air at a time, but to keep flying every day, two machines will be necessary. One can be gone over every other day while the other is in the air. Five hours a day will be required to make the patrol."

"Instead of the ordinary equipment of 80-gallon gasoline tanks, each ship will have special 50-gallon tanks so that no landings for fuel will be necessary during the entire patrol. Each ship will carry complete photographic equipment."

"In addition to the pilot, an observer will be carried. I believe that the patrol will demonstrate effectively the practicability of commercial aviation."
