VICTIM LIVED GAY LIFE

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Process of untangling the mystery surrounding the slaying of Frederick Schneider, wealthy contractor, led the authorities today into details of the gay life he led at his Bronx apartment and his palatial camp at Glen Cairn, in the Adirondacks, and revealed that he counted many beautiful women among his friends.

In the meantime, Mrs. Anna Buzzi, the woman with whom he lived for seven years, and who was held as a material witness, instituted habeas corpus proceedings for her release from jail. The proceedings was argued in the Bronx county court and decision reserved until tomorrow.

Miss Dorothy Hines, a stenographer and friend of Schneider, told the district attorney she nearly always attended functions at Schneider's apartment here and the house parties he gave at Glen Cairn. Mrs. Buzzi was at those house parties but never displayed jealousy that the girl observed.
