CHICKEN AND EGG YAL—
USE LOWER LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, March 5.—More chickens were raised and more eggs produced last year than in 1921 but their farm value was not so great. The combined farm value of chickens raised and eggs produced in 1922 is estimated at \$354,307,000, by the United States department of agriculture. The value in 1921 was \$360,820,000.

About 542,000,000 chickens were raised on farms in 1922, with a farm value of \$354,307,000, as compared with 510,000,000 chickens raised in 1921 valued at \$360,820,000. Egg production totaled 1,562,356,000 dozen eggs of a value of \$100,000,000, as compared with 1,837,456,000 dozen eggs with a value of \$103,567,000 in 1921.

Of the chicken value produced in 1922, large quantities were consumed in industries in the manufacture of other than food products, and about 113,000,000 dozen were used to produce chicken, the department says.

The average farm price of chickens raised in 1922 was 65 cents per pound, compared with 71 cents in 1921, and with 86 1/2 cents in 1920. The average farm price of chicken eggs was 25.5 cents a dozen in 1922, compared with 29.2 cents per dozen in 1921 and with 44.4 cents in 1920.

It is estimated that there were 412,000,000 chickens on farms Jan. 1, 1922, a time of year when the number of chickens is low. There were 366,000,000 chickens on farms Jan. 1, 1921, and on January 1, 1920, there were 336,000,000, according to census figures.

VIGILANT COMMITTEE OF BOYS ENFORCES LAW

BUFFALO, March 5.—The city has a full-fledged vigilante committee with a membership of several hundred. The members do not wear masks nor do they carry clubs, but they are very earnest organization that believe it has a mission in better citizenship and law-abidance.

The committee was formed by students of Lafayette high school after a number of boys of the institution had been arrested and convicted

in the slaying of a police officer who tried to arrest a trio of boys in a stolen car.

Repeated offenses by Lafayette boys, the student body and faculty decided, were giving the school a "black eye," and plans were discussed at assembly to break up the wave of lawlessness. The outcome was the vigilante committee, an oath-bound organization for law enforcement and the protection of the school name.

Offenders are brought before the vigilants for trial, but sentences imposed, if any, are carried out by the faculty.

CLAIMS TO HAVE ROUTED ENEMIES OF OLD AGE

LONDON, March 5.—Professor Burton Seasmann, of the Dover Radium Institute, has discovered that by the use of radio-phosphate of potash, a man can be rejuvenated in a remarkable manner, according to the Westminster Gazette's correspondent. It is claimed that as a result of the treatment a man can live to be 125; always felt as fresh as a daisy; and develop the square jaw which is an essential feature of the American movie hero.

A retired banker of Wokingham gave an interviewer a remarkable account of his mental and physical transformation as the result of taking advantage of Professor Seasmann's discovery. This man, who is 77 years old and who took the treatment for three years, says his eyes are stronger than they were 16 years ago. He can read without glasses, his voice has become deeper and stronger, and he has no more "dried feeling" any more.

ESCAPING GAS FATAL TO SIX

CHICAGO, March 4.—Six persons—three generations of one family—were killed today when a deadly gas of an acid, used as a disinfectant on the first floor of a restaurant, seeped

through a forgotten opening in old walls up to the second floor flat.

A dozen other persons probably are alive only because they slept with windows open, for the fumes were so penetrating that canaries and gold fish in neighboring flats, even as high as the third floor, succumbed.

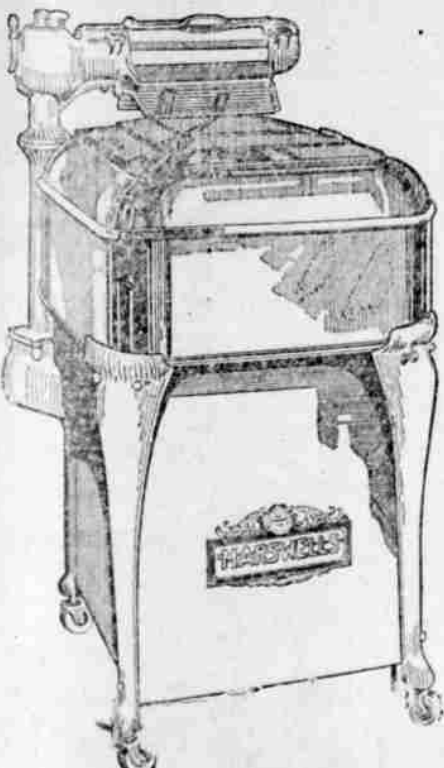
