COOPERATIVE MOVEMENT IS GROWING IN TEXAS, ARIZONA

(The Associated Press.)
DALLAS, Tex., March 6.—More than 75,000 cotton growers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona and Arkansas now market their product through cooperative organizations, according to reports from these organizations just made public.

In Texas the Farm Bureau Cotton Growers association numbers 20,000 members; in Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Cotton Growers have a membership

of 36,000; in Arizona there are 12,000 and in Arkansas more than 7,000.

L. F. McKay, educational director of the American Cotton Growers Exchange states that the cotton belonging to these members are placed in warehouses and the grower is advanced money to the amount of 60 per cent of the value of his crop at the first of the year. After this the cotton is pooled and sold in an orderly manner, preserving an average price for the year.

However, the cooperative movement appears to have made great headway in other agricultural lines in Texas, the cotton growers Exchange numbers 43 local organizations while the Sweet Potato Growers number 126 members in 18 counties. The wool and Mohair farmers have organized what is known as the Southwestern Farm Bureau Wool and Mohair association with 540 sheep and goat raisers. This association handled 1,300,000 pounds of wool last season according to its secretary's report.

All of these associations claim as their object the orderly selling of their product in order to keep the market steady.

The Texas Wheat Growers association, organized early in 1922 had a membership of more than 1,000 members in 25 counties in Texas and in January was reported to be growing at the rate of 50 per cent a week.

Other cooperative associations with smaller memberships now operating in this state are the Texas Hay association, with 600 members; the Texas New Mexico Alfalfa Growers association; the Texas Farm Bureau Union Growers association and the Texas Cattle Raisers and Producers association.

FARM POINTERS.

(O. A. C. Experiment Station.)
Bordeaux Best Moss Control.
Moss and lichens on fruit trees may be quickly destroyed during the winter by spraying with ordinary lye at the rate of one pound to 6 or 8 gallons of water. If San Jose or other scale is present add the lye dissolved in a little water to the usual winter strength lime-sulfur. Thorough spraying of this solution will remove both moss and scale. Lye removes moss rapidly but not permanently. For permanent prevention the O. A. C. Experiment Station recommends the usual Bordeaux spray. Applied for apple tree anthracnose, peach leaf curl, and prune and cherry blossom blight it will prevent the moss from developing.

Swine Raising Profitable.

Swine raising is generally profitable, according to 1921 and 1922 reports of the United States department of agriculture, says H. A. Lindgren, Oregon Agricultural college extension specialist. These reports, from the corn belt region, show that in 1922 there was an increase of 27 per cent in the number of litters of fall pigs farrowed in that region as compared with a like report for 1921, showing an increase of 18 per cent.

The old rule still applies—that when the cost of 616 pounds of corn is as low as the market price of 100 pounds of pork, live weight, there is a tendency toward an increased production of hogs, but when the cost of 616 pounds of corn is more than the market price for 100 pounds of pork the production decreases.

Lime-Sulfur Controls Scab.

Apple scab and pear scab are likely to cause much more damage this season than last, reports the O. A. C. experiment station. Winter or dormant sprays will not control these diseases. Two sprays of lime-sulfur applied in early spring before blossoming are necessary to get the cleanest fruit and greatest profits. The first application should be made just after the winter buds unfold and the second just before the first blossoms open. Use one gallon of concentrated lime-sulfur to 50 of water for the first spray and one to 40 for the second spray.

"Finding a sarcophagus empty is a most common experience of Egyptologists. But most of us who have explored in Egypt did not sell photographic and newspaper rights in advance."

PORTLAND, March 5.—Dismissal of the John L. Etheridge citizenship cancellation suit was held in abeyance for 30 days this morning by Federal Judge C. E. Wolfert on the motion of Thomas H. Maguire, chief assistant United States attorney.

The judge ordered some action in the case by April 2, at which time he said it would be called up again for dismissal.

Maguire laid the blame for delay on the defendant, claiming that action has been deferred at request of Etheridge's attorneys.

"It is the intention of our office to proceed with this case," Maguire said in asking a continuance.

"No divorce becomes final until a year after the judgment roll is filed. Valentino obtained an interlocutory decree January 10, 1922, but the judgment roll was not filed until March 3, 1922. Under these circumstances, Valentino could not possibly be legally married until March 10 of this year, and then only when the final decree is granted," said Judge Summerfield.

W. Holden of Tillamook county, who was with Priole and Grover C. Todd, also a federal agent and victim of the shooting.

Mrs. Holden was married under her maiden name, Nettie M. Lewis. She gave her age as 21 years and Holden admitted 23 years. The license was secured here and the ceremony was performed by Rev. W. O. Holden, United Brethren minister here. Mrs. Holden was left with three small children to care for on the death of Priole.

ATTACKS MADE ON CHURCHILL

SALEM, March 5.—Federal authorities are being called upon to determine the identity of whoever may be responsible for statewide propaganda being fired at Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill. The propaganda consists of a letter being sent broadcast in various forms, but having for its main purpose the allegation that Churchill is suspected of being a sufferer from a virulent form of insanity which he is taking out on the teachers and pupils. The letters purport to be signed by one "Thomas Carroll, M. D." of Portland, but investigation fails to reveal the existence of any such physician in that city.

Superintendent Churchill himself will make no comment on the letter, although he expressed himself as having some suspicion of who is guilty of its circulation.

The letter seemingly has gone to every city and county superintendent, to every principal, to school boards and a large number of teachers. The superintendent's office has received numerous copies of the letter from several parts of the state indicative of its widespread circulation.
