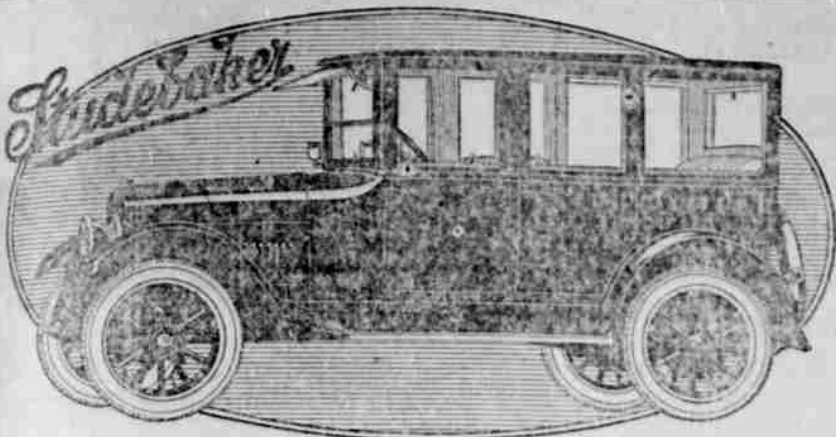

for another heinous offense against a woman. The California authorities listened to her plea, and the man was released to her, and she brought him to Portland and kept him under her wardship, until he turned on her like a tiger and murdered her. He was caught in Alaska and brought back in irons. On his return he declared had capital punishment been in effect he would not have committed the deed. Mrs. Freeman was a W. C. T. U. worker, philanthropist and deeply interested in prison reform work.

Tommy Lotisno, another of the select band of trusties weeded out for favors by Warden Smith, came to the prison March 3, 1921. He is a wife murderer and for hours the jury wavered in doubt as to whether to send him to the gallows or to the penitentiary for life. Lenancy Fin-

ally won in the jury's mind, but a cry of protest went up at the time which has not altogether subsided.

Still another of the trusties picked out by Warden Smith for outside honors is George Kemp. George Kemp has been trying to round out a sentence of from one to seven years and as he was received at the prison June 25, 1912, he has been nearly nine years trying to make the seven. The reason for this is that he has been twice paroled and once escaped. The time when out on parole or while an escapee does not count against his time in the prison so he is still trying to finish up the time that already should have expired.

Another of the band of trusties is J. B. Kawachucki, more familiarly known to the world of the police as John Bruno. He was the doubtful hero of a murder which shocked Portland to the depths a few years ago when a man's body was found in a graveyard of the metropolis where it had been lying for some time, badly mauled. Bruno was finally caught and came up to the prison April 20, 1921, after the authorities had unraveled the story of how he and his partner, the slain man, both sailors, had come to Portland from a foreign country and the partner was lured to the graveyard where he was done to death. Bruno is having the run of the place now.

Frank Payne is still another selected by Warden Smith, a trusty and dropped down to a cell a few days ago to "have his teeth fixed," as he told some of the boys he met at the corner of State and Commercial streets. Frank Payne was sent out to the open world camp at Marion, or rather went out. The fact of Payne being a trusty is more interesting when it is remembered two years ago it was the man who bore the name of Warden Lewis in a race to the lockyard guard where he was killed, and on the 30th of the furnace started a big fire that ran toward the tower. He was picked up while trying to peddle a small article he had stolen at the prison.

The list could be lengthened considerably. But from every indication, at Woodcamp, in trusty position, and in various capacities Warden Smith has nearly one-third of the prison population very busy running about outside of the prison walls.

After obtaining a permit to leave the state, she rode five hours, standing up in a box wagon, which takes the place of street cars there. Tired and discouraged, she arrived in Switzerland, where she enjoyed a much better visit with her brother, Christof Wettstein, and family.

On her return trip to the U. S., Miss Wettstein reported a severe storm. The boat was in the storm for 12 hours. Passengers were equipped with life-rafts, and boats were lowered ready for action in case of emergency. CHANGE IN PLANS NEEDED IN MOSCOW

(By Associated Press.) MOSCOW, March 8.—Russian ships loaded with grain for western Europe may steam out of Soviet harbors at the same time that American ships, likewise laden with grain for the Russian famine sufferers, steam into Russian ports, unless present plans of the Soviet government are changed.

The Russian authorities, largely interested at this time in the building up of future agricultural and industrial possibilities, anticipate that they will be able to export even more food stuffs than they are asking such foreign organizations as the American Relief Administration to import. They explain the apparent inconsistencies of this plan by the statement that the outflowing foodstuffs are private property, and that, to be considered in their new policy of permitting private initiative, they cannot confiscate this food for famine needs, even though they have to request that food be sent into Russia to prevent thousands of deaths from starvation.

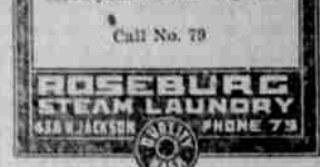
The grain for export, they say, is the property of various co-operative societies accumulated by them from individual peasants who, in some fruitful regions, had a surplus above their own needs. This surplus was consigned to the societies to be exchanged abroad for implements and other articles which the peasants must have, but cannot secure in Russia.

Asked why the government does not help its own people when there is sufficient food in the country to feed the entire populace, instead of continuing to plead for American and other foreign aid, one official said that if the surplus surplus of the peasants were taken away from him this year, he probably would not raise any more grain than he absolutely needed for himself next year.

"The Government had to abandon the policy of requisitioning supplies from the peasants two years ago, and to encourage them to plant more grain than they needed for their own use."

this official said. "If we started again to requisition grain from the peasants or co-operatives, we not only would undo all of the work of two years, but would be directly refuting our new policy of free trade."

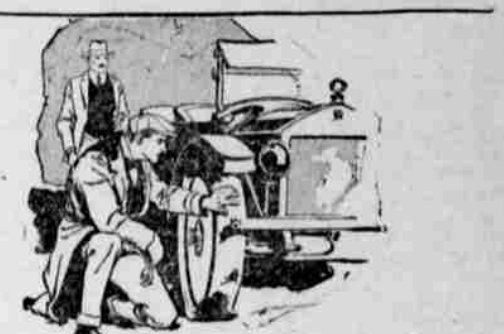
At a recent meeting of The State Plan Commission, the official statistician declared that Russia should be able to export from last year's crop about 100,000,000 pounds, or roughly 60 million bushels of grain. The time is now ripe, this expert said, for Russia to endeavor to regain the European bread market. He doubted, however, the ability of the co-operatives to handle such a large quantity of grain. A small amount of Russian rye and wheat is already at the ports, but up to the present time little of it has actually been placed aboard ship for export.

The Scandinavian countries are expected to be the principal buyers of Russian grain this year.
