## WOMEN KEEP CLOSE TAB ON LEGISLATORS

LINCOLN, Neb., March 8.—Although  
members of the Nebraska state legis-  
lature have been allowed considerable  
latitude, they have been keenly alert  
to the fact that the women of the  
state are extremely particular as to  
the grist for the legislative hopper. These  
women have kept constant vigil over  
the contents of the sluice boxes, and

have been successful in their efforts.

New Jersey farmers were paying  
the highest taxes in 1922, with an  
average of 2.22 per acre, compared  
with 96 cents in 1914, an increase  
of 132 per cent. Arizona farmers  
were paying the lowest taxes, 7 cen-  
ts per acre, which was the same as  
paid in 1914.

In Iowa, premier farm products  
state of the union, farmers were  
paying an average of \$1.43 com-  
pared with 68 cents in 1914, an in-  
crease of 120 per cent.

In Texas, second farm production  
state, the 1922 average was 35 cents  
an acre, compared with 17 cents in  
1914, an increase of 114 per cent.

The largest increase was in Ar-  
kansas, with a jump of 160 per cent,  
the 1922 taxes averaging 66 cents  
per acre, compared with 18 cents in  
1914.

The average taxes paid per acre  
on farm lands in 1914 and 1922 by  
states include: Montana 7 and 16  
cents; Wyoming 19 and 29c; Colo-  
rado 20 and 68c; New Mexico 19 and  
35c; Arizona, 7 and 7c; Utah, 24 and  
42c; Nevada, 21 and 43c; Idaho, 59  
and 140c; Washington, 33 and 70c;  
Oregon, 27 and 75c; California, 42  
and 75c.

FARM TAX DOUBLES IN  
PAST EIGHT YEARS

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Farm  
on farm labor taxes are more than  
doubled in the eight years from  
1914 to 1922.

A canvass of the department of  
agriculture, just completed, shows

the average amount of state, county  
and local taxes paid by farmers  
throughout the country in 1922 to  
have been 70.9 cents per acre com-  
pared with 34.4 cents in 1914. That  
was an increase of 126 per cent in  
the eight years. The canvass dis-  
closed that roads and public schools  
were the principal causes of the in-  
creased taxes.
