### SOUL STAGES A COME-BACK

NEW YORK, N. Y., March 12. (U. P.) The parasol will assume an important role in the summer fashion. For the past few years women have braved the sun's rays in the effort of getting a fashionable sunburn, but they have found that the once burnt becomes coarse and requires months of bleaching before it regains its original texture and whiteness.

Beach fashions predict the use of parasols for the spring and summer at the resort and Palm Beach destinations. A galaxy of parasols there are some from this year—from fluffed taffetas to crotonones and red cottons—parasols of every shade and material, and for every conceivable occasion. There are the many spoked shapes and with pongee silks which come in shades such as mountain pink, lemon and orchid. Often they are monogrammed near the edge of a shade darker than the rest.

### Batiked Parasols.

Dark or oblong parasols of batiked fabric fitted tightly over the frames and withers are very popular since batik craze is on. These are made in black and white than they are in the more extravagant tones. Often the printed effects are

crotonones and India prints for beach use. While these are in expensive they are very effective. Then, there are the flowered taffetas in pretty soft colors and handpainted taffetas, which are just as popular for beach use and are more dressy. Often parasols have tops of one color and linings of another. A French import of navy blue taffeta embroidered in medallions in red and gold has a lining of red China silk. Tiny gold braid outlines the border of the parasol corresponding with the gold used in the medallions which are placed between each spoke. Red tips add another touch that is new. The many ruffled taffeta parasols in dome-shapes are lovely with the summer frock. While these are somewhat costly in the shops one can purchase a plain taffeta parasol and an additional yard or so of taffeta of the same shade and make one very easily. Make Your Own. Cut the material in strips four inches wide, fray one edge about half an inch and gather the other and sew by hand with tiny stitches to the para-

sol starting at the small end. The frayed edge makes a pretty baby finish for the ruffle. Then too overlap one ruffle over the other so that the stitches do not show and finish about the point with a stirred puff of taffeta. Five ruffles should be ample. The present craze for theingham bathing suit brings the vogue for the ingham parasol, which is decidedly youthful and flattering. Wooden handles are used on most of the parasols this season and often they have bunches of carved fruit painted in natural colors. Among the novelty handles are the French doll heads of wood, painted in colors and with hair of yellow wool. Carved dog heads are popular handles on parasols for sports wear. Paint Your Own. Recently I stopped in an art shop and saw girls painting parasol handles in brilliant colors and sewing braids of different shades about the borders of parasols. A parasol of navy blue had a brilliant red handle and a border of narrow braid placed one after the other in shades of red, gold and French blue. Women who are handy with the paint brush and the needle can turn an ordinary appearing sunshade into a thing of beauty.

D. S. PHILIPS TWO GREAT SHIPS  
CAMDEN, N. J., March 12 (United Press).—Two Pacific steamships are now under construction for the United States and at the New York ship building yards here. The other at the West River Shipyards. Originally the two steamship carriers were to have been the battle carriers, destroyers and torpedo boat destroyers of the naval program at the time the President presented the Peace program and shortly thereafter but interference with development of the art of aerial warfare.

convert them into airplane carriers, with super-equipment of every sort. Each of the carriers is to be 850 feet long with a beam of 105 feet. The upper surface of each boat will be fashioned into a long flat landing platform for airplanes. The smokestacks will look like three stacks widened and flattened into one and will be crowded to the starboard side of the ship to allow room for the easy landing and taking off of the air fleet the ship will mother. Storage facilities for airplanes and machine shops for their un-keep and repair shops will be below decks. When placed in commission, the two carriers will be combination hangars, machine shops and landing fields. The speed they will be able to attain is intended to permit them to keep ahead of an enemy battleship and to dodge torpedoes fired from enemy destroyers and submarines. Their engines will be capable of developing 180,000 horsepower through four electrically driven shafts. The carriers will be able to develop a speed of 33 knots an hour (about 30 miles) despite the fact that each ship will weigh more than 33,000 tons. The superiority of the ships will be increased by the completeness of the radio installation, the elevators for lifting aircraft to and from the decks, cranes for hoisting heavier reconnaissance planes and their maneuverability in a heavy sea. The two carriers will be completed within two years.
