FAMOUS SPEAKER IS HERE TONIGHT

The 1922-1923 Knights of Columbus campaign against extreme radicalism and for constructive thought and service will be brought home to the citizens of Roseburg when Peter W. Collins, well-known industrial expert and lecturer on sociological and economic subjects, will appear at the armory tonight on "Why America Means to Us," under the auspices of local Council, K. of C.

Mr. Collins is acknowledged to be one of the best equipped authorities on industrial problems. He has for over twenty-five years given his best effort for harmonious and right relations between labor and capital.

Serving as industrial expert with the federal government during the war and as an active labor executive for many years before the war became in contact with every phase of the sociological-economic problems. He holds the distinction of being the first and only expert on socialism bolshevism and I. W. Niam to be called before any legislative or judicial tribunal, and acted as such in the famous New York investigation and testifying for three full days.

As director general of K. of C. reconstruction and employment work after the war, Mr. Collins had charge of the functioning of the K. of C. system that placed 300,000 former service men back in civilian employment without a cent of cost to either employer or employees—constituting what Secretary of Labor James J. Davis characterizes as the most amazing feat in the history of modern employment management.

Mr. Collins' lecture will be under the auspices of the K. of C. Council which has issued a general invitation to the public to hear him.

Three plates said to have been used in counterfeiting were seized. Agents said that Dimm was in a gang with three men under arrest in San Francisco, Robert Yates, alias J. Martin; Fred Atkins, alias R. B. Williams, alias J. H. Moore, and Edward Nicodemous, alias J. Prince. More than \$10,000 in bogus money is said to have been found in the possession of this trio, while Dimm is declared to have admitted that he made counterfeiters of a face value of \$15,500. Bogus notes of this issue were said to have been found in Portland, Salem, Sacramento and San Francisco.
