

### FIVE TEAMS CHOSEN FOR CONFERENCE

SALEM, March 11.—Five district basketball champions which will enter the state inter-scholastic tournament to be held here the last three days of next week, March 15-16-17 have sent their records to Coach Bohler of Willamette University. They are Salem, Myrtle Point, The Dalles, Medford, and University high school, Eugene.

Two district tournaments are being held which will close this evening so that two more winners will be known by Monday. In eastern Oregon Athena and Pendleton are deciding which team shall enter the tournament. Yesterday evening, according to word reaching Coach Bohler, Athena won and with one more victory out of two games will be assured the trip. Another set of games is being played between McMinnville and Forest Grove with the dope favoring the former five.

According to unofficial reports, the championship of the district in which Joseph and LaGrande are located will be known by the first of next week, the deciding game to be played then. Word comes from Clatskanie that they have won all their games so far and desire to know what other teams to play before being assured the trip here. It is thought that they will probably be forced to meet either Gresham or Astoria before they can make the journey and according to reports would likely meet defeat at the hands of either five.

Coach George "Dutch" Bohler of the University of Oregon and Ralph Coleman of Oregon Agricultural college, have been selected to serve as referees during the tournament. One game will be played on Thursday, four on Friday with the semi-finals and finals coming Saturday. All money taken in at the tournament following the taking out of enough to cover local expenses, will be divided among the teams to partially meet their expenses of travel.

### NO QUICK CURE FOR THE FARMER

WASHINGTON, March 9.—Reviewing acts of the last congress affecting agriculture and forecasting probable legislation in the next congress, Senator Capper, Republican, Kansas, chairman of the senate farm bloc in a statement issued today declared "there is no quick and sure cure for the troubles of the farmer."

Legislation cannot increase the price of farm products, he said, "but laws which the 67th congress enacted" in his opinion will be of material assistance to agriculture interests.

Congress erred, Senator Capper contended in failing to accept Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals.

**Peace Time Operation Essential**  
"The country should have the benefit of the peace-time operation of this huge enterprise," he said.

Declaring the biggest problem before congress was that relating to transportation, the Kansas senator asserted that "freight rates are too high and must come down."

The 67th congress started agriculture on its way to a lasting prosperity, Senator Capper declared, listing as "farm bloc" measures which he placed on the statute books, the cooperative marketing act, the anti-trust gambling act, the packers' stockyard act, the emergency tariff, the act giving farmers representation on the federal reserve board; the filled milk measure; the act extending to agriculture aid for the war finance corporation and the farm credit act.

### RAISING FUNDS FOR BUILDING

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE, Ore., March 10, (Special).—A well defined movement is now underway on the University of Oregon campus for a student union building which would be built by capital raised by the students.

Such a structure would contain offices for all student body officers, meeting rooms for student body legislative bodies and committees, the co-operative store, recreation room, a dining room, alumni headquarters including secretary's office, alumni magazine office and, in time, headquarters to accommodate graduates while here.

A distinct need is felt for a building to fit these needs on the Oregon campus and the student body is showing interest in the project of raising the necessary funds.

At a recent meeting of the senior class a motion was adopted which provides that each member of the class shall pledge himself to donate \$10 a year for the next ten years to create a student union building fund as a class memorial. This was the first active step taken for the new structure and it is expected others will follow. A tax of one dollar per term for each student upon registration is being discussed and different organizations and classes are outlining ways to swell the fund.

The first wing of the building would cost between \$50,000 and \$75,000. A building to serve rudimentary needs can be built for this amount and other wings added later as funds are made available. Leaders of the project hope to have the building started within five days.

Other universities in the west have such buildings, the recently completed \$250,000 structure on the University of California campus being a notable example.
