NEW ELECTRIC BRAKE IS WONDER

A test was made this afternoon of the new electric brake which the Automatic Electric Brake company has developed. The new brake gives three times the amount of power as the old brake and applies the power with twice the speed. The improvements have been worked out after a long series of tests and have resulted in the elimination of the weak features of the old brake. Ample power is now available for all uses and further experiments will be made in the east where producers of heavy equipment are anxious to secure a brake suitable for their use. In tests this afternoon the new brake easily pulled over 2,000 pounds and applied its full strength in less than two seconds, showing the unlimited power of this machine when applied to brakes on automobiles, street cars, trucks, trailers, etc.

RYANER PUT IN TROUBLE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 14.—Bertha Reed, alias Bertha Edwards, paroled last December, during the administration of State Senator Roy Ryan on a pending governor when twenty-eight convicts were granted paroles, pardons and commutations of sentence, was today by the grand jury today on a charge of forgery. The offense is alleged to have been committed February 1 and the charge is that the defendant passed a worthless check on the Northwestern National bank for \$5.75.

BANK'S AFFAIRS SIFTED

CHICAGO, March 14.—The first indictment in connection with the grand jury investigation of the affairs of the Loan Square Trust and Savings bank, closed last week, after Fred W. Pepp, its president was found with a bullet through his head, was returned today against David Weidman, Jr., vice-president of the bank, who was charged with forgery. Weidman was indicted on three counts, the chief of which accused him of having fraudulently obtained \$10,000 by forging a note upon the Harvey, Illinois, State bank, of which his father is president. Plans were being discussed today for a reorganization of the bank by depositors and the authorities were still investigating Pepp's affairs and the circumstances surrounding his death.

FIRE AT PORT AU PRINCE

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, March 14.—A spark from a soldering iron which was being used to close a hole in a gasoline can this afternoon, started a fire in the Texas company's building which destroyed that building and razed two thirds of a business district of the city.
