### PIONEER IS BURNED BY BOY SCOUTS

BUTTE, Mont., March 19.—Boy  
Scouts of Butte gave burial to John  
Korn, one of the founders and the  
last trader of Missoula City, once  
a prosperous pioneer camp in the  
hills ten miles south of here.

The aged pioneer was found  
dead in his cabin, with his dog  
watching his body. It took a re-  
scue party twenty hours to get the body

through the snow to Butte.

When it was announced that no  
relatives of the old miner could be  
found, that he had no visible estate  
and that he would be buried at once,  
the Boy Scouts took hold  
of the situation. The summer camp  
of the Butte troops had been near  
Korn's cabin and from him they had  
learned wood lore. Contributions  
from the boys raised the money for  
a coffin and a burial tract, and  
eight boys went to the hill.

### FIG TREES IN ARIZONA

TUCSON, Ariz., March 19.—Ar-  
izona forests, produced \$2,500,000  
worth of timber during the year end-  
ing December 31 last, according to  
statement by William H. Kuhn,  
chief of the Arizona Forestry De-  
partment, with headquarters here,  
in an address given before the  
Rotarian organization.

Of Arizona's forest supply, Mr.  
Kuhn said:

"It is estimated by the Forestry  
Department that Arizona has 5,  
000,000 acres of forest land, pro-  
ducing about 5,000 feet in the year.  
And in winter and summer for  
forest protection and re-planting  
of that portion now cleared, he ad-  
ded: "At the rate at which the tim-  
ber was cut during the year just  
ended, the supply will have been  
exhausted in approximately twenty  
years."

### M'ADDO TO BUILD GIANT FACTORY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 19.  
(United Press).—William Gibbs Mc-  
Adoo, former secretary of the treas-  
ury, who lately has shown wide-  
spread business activity, announced  
that he and a group of Los Angeles  
capitalists will soon build a factory  
here to be known as the Los Angeles  
Cotton Mills Company.

Negotiations have been completed  
by the company for the purchase of  
a 400-acre tract of land. More than  
\$1,000,000 will be spent by the com-  
pany within the next ten months,  
improving the property with the first  
unit of the giant cotton mills. When  
completed the mills will cost over  
\$3,000,000.
