NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon on Friday the 6th day of April, 1923 at the hour of ten (10) o'clock a. m. for the sale of Three Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$380,000.00) bonds of said county, all to be dated May 1st, 1923 and issued in denominations of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) or multiples thereof up to One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) at the option of the successful bidder and bearing interest not to exceed six (6) per cent per annum payable semi-annually in the office of the county treasurer of Douglas County, Oregon or at the fiscal agent of said county in New York City, New York, at the option of the bidder on the first day of May and the first day of November of each year, said bonds shall mature as follows:

SALEM, March 19.—Reckless and imprudent driving of an automobile rather than manslaughter, was the charge on which the Marion county grand jury today indicted Miss Ella Wolfe, 18, of Salem, whose car struck and fatally injured Mrs. Elizabeth Hubbard an elderly Salem woman, on February 17.
