TELLEGEN WAS A REAL "DON JUAN"

NEW YORK, March 19.—Lou Telle-
gen, actor, who is being sued for di-
vorce by Geraldine Farrar, former
Metropolitan opera star, was described
today as a "Don Juan" of stage, son-
nets and Ghetto, by witnesses testi-
fying for the divorce before Referee
Thomas H. Mahoney.

These witnesses named two "strikingly
beautiful" young women as co-
respondents. One was Miss Lerna
Ambler, an Australian actress. The
other was referred to only as "Miss
—," an American actress who played
in the same company with Tellegen in
1921.

A third woman, said to be known
in San Francisco as Bessie Clifford,
was named in the complaint, but no
mention was made of her today.
Two of the witnesses, W. F. Beers
and Louis Maltramer, owners of bungal-
ows in a colony on Long Beach, de-
scribed a "month of bliss" spent in
July, 1921, by Tellegen and Miss Am-
bler in a cottage facing the sea.
Beers said he rented one of his
bungalows to a man named Rankin,

said to be Tellegen's secretary. Rankin
and his wife spent several days
in the cottage before Tellegen and the
young woman arrived. Beers said he
did not pay much attention to the two
companions of the house, but that he
knew they lived there together. Several
times he saw them on the beach.

ATHLETIC PLANT VALUE TO STUDENTS

(By United Press)
EUGENE, March 20.—The physical edu-
cation of every man and woman student
and even the faculty of the University
of Oregon is to be provided for with
the development of a huge athletic
plant, to be the working laboratory of
the school of physical education ac-
cording to a recent announcement by
Dean John F. Bovard, head of that
phase of the University's activities.

A great tract lying on sloping ground
between University avenue and Azusa
street is to be terraced and here will
be built a new baseball field, football
and soccer gridirons, tennis courts, a
220-yard straightaway and a fine new
gymnasium. The fields will be de-
dicated to varsity, freshmen and intra-
mural sports and construction will be
started immediately.

Plans for a great portion of the de-
velopment already have been com-
pleted and much of the money neces-
sary for the work has been provided.
The plan for the most part is spon-
sored by the Associated Students of
the University.

Worked out by engineers in charge of
the work the tract will be terraced in
five steps, the first to include Hay-
ward field, recently dedicated, a new
baseball diamond, at least 20 cement
tennis courts and the new 220-yard
straightaway.

Work on the new diamond will be
started immediately so that it will be
ready for the spring baseball season,
if possible.

The new straightaway, upon which
work will start at once will be tangent
to the Hayward field oval. The new
tennis courts will occupy property
now owned by Campbell Church of
Eugene, who has agreed to lease to
the students.

The three middle terraces will be
divided into four intramural baseball
diamonds and varsity and freshman
football and soccer fields. The fifth
terrace will be the site for the new
gymnasium. The gymnasium is ex-
pected to be one of the finest in the
west.

SPECIAL EASTER SERVICES PLANNED

The M. E. church is making plans
for a week's program leading up to
Easter. The services will start on
Palm Sunday, March 25 with a ser-
mon on "The Immortality of Child-
ren" in the morning and "Immortal-
ity a Natural Intuition" in the eve-
ning. Services will then be held

each evening using subjects pertain-
ing to the Easter season. The music
will be in charge of Mrs. C. S. Hest-
line who is planning on one or more
special songs for each evening.
