STUDENTS WHO FAIL

Reports from the colleges indicate that a good many students, are being sent home for failure to keep up with their studies. Many young fellows do not regard such an episode as anything to feel badly about. In a good many cases, the boy may have done as well as he could, but he was not naturally a student and could not grasp the lessons. But in many other cases these fellows did not regard their studies as the main purpose of school or college. They attempted to make friends, participate in athletics and have a good time. They feel that they accomplished those ends, so are all satisfied with what they achieved, even though they failed in the class room. It is an unhappy day for fathers and mothers when the boys and girls fail to keep up and are invited to resign. They sent those young people there, hoping they would gain a fit trade. The motto over a famous school, translated from Latin, runs to this effect: "Enter boys, and here become men." Those who fail to accomplish the end their parents had in mind may not necessarily be to blame, but they have disappointed hopes that were earnestly cherished. If their failure was through their own fault, they have failed to make good the trust that was committed to them, and have made one wrong step on the journey of life. But it is never too late to correct such a misstep. Flunking in school has been a shock that has aroused many young people from their indifferent attitude. It has stirred them to realize that they must fight for success themselves, and that they cannot attain it as the result of gifts handed down from parents.

On one occasion a cunning spider invited a buzzing fly into his house. The fly knew about the love of spiders for flies and he therefore refused risk his life by accepting the spider's invitation, so he flew away. When the fly came back by the spider's place the invitation was renewed with the addition of flattering remarks about the beautiful eyes and beautiful lace-like wings of the fly. The poor fly gave way to this pleasing flattery and entered the spider's den to be devoured for lunch. The other day in New York City the story of the spider and the weak fly was repeated. Under the flattering influence of a gazing, admiring multitude, and the fabled bag of gold at the rainbow's end, a human fly ended his life at lunch time. A bowl of sugar in a nice warm spot will attract flies by the dozens. There is another species of flies to whom the yellow quarantine placard upon a home acts as the magnetic bowl of sugar. They flatter themselves by rushing in to see if the doctor was correct in his diagnosis, and to offer professional advice that they are not qualified to give. We admire courage and bravery on any occasion. But the fellow who recklessly enters a quarantined premises under the assumption that he is not afraid of any disease germ, because he is so strong and healthy, is not brave. He is just another poor, weak fly falling for self flattery. Just a plain fool.

A very attractive booklet issued by the U. S. Savings System tells what the Government is doing to encourage the people to practice economy and thrift. About twelve years ago the Postal Savings System was established, chiefly for the benefit of the foreign born who would trust their earnings only with the Government for safe keeping. During the war the national savings movement grew in importance when war saving stamps and certificates were sold to persons of small means who wanted a safe investment, and who patriotically wished to meet the requests of the Government for money to carry on the war. But these savings securities were not adapted to war conditions, and a new method to carry on the savings movement was devised. The Government Savings System was reorganized and Treasury savings certificates were issued to take the place of war saving securities. New life was injected into the system and it is now working upon broad lines. It is conducting a campaign of education to teach the people to save; to have them avoid the swindling operations which take hundreds of millions of hard earned money from them; and, it is offering for sale a sound, safe and convenient form of investment in denominations within the reach of all, and which are fully explained in the booklet.
